Per Cent of Supply Graded No. 3

Sept. 23rd. Although plentiful supply of some fruit the situation at the time is described as any-encouraging due to the conservative climate of the fall places it anything like an average and again the quality so not been up to the stand-

Speaking to the Telegraph last evening, a local dealer said that the indications pointed to a very meagre crop, and of the shipments already received more than 50 per cent were graded No. 3. There are a few good apples on the market, but the price is away up in the air. They are selling at from \$1.50 to \$1.50 per barrel.

Peaches, on the other hand, are very plentiful, the quality is extra good and the prices reasonable. The dealer said that he had very seldom seen a better class of goods sold here in the city.

The plum season is about done. Probably the last shipment will be received about the middle of the week. Although they have come in good quantities from Ontario, the Nova Scotia crop has been very light. In fact, very little of the Nova Scotia product has been in evidence this year.

Heavy frosts about the Cape Cod region has put a damper on the cranberry supply and will tend to boost the price from this time forward. Heretofore, the supply has been good and the prices very moderate.

The grapes are now coming in large quantities and there is every indication of a bumper crop. Nevertheless the price is a little above last year, which is accounted for by the fact that the cost of baskets has been almost doubled.

Pears have been plentiful this year, but are now thinning out, as the season is drawing to a close.

A considerable advance in the price of onions is noticeable, resulting from a rather short crop, but the class of stock being shipped at the present time is considered to be well worth the price asked. "We have seldom had a better quality of onions on sale here," said one of the wholesalers yesterday.
