And further take notice that if any person assessed in such roll claims that any person firm, company, association or corporation has been assessed too low, or has been omitted from or wrongfully inserted in such roll, he may, on or before the Tenth day of February, give notice in writing to the undersigned, the Town Clerk, that he appeals in respect to the assessment of the said person, firm, company association or corporation, and shall in such notice state particularly the grounds of his objections.

WINNIPEG "BOOTLEGGERS" FINED \$1,000.

Winnipeg, Man Dec. 31.—A fine of \$1,000 and costs, or six months in jail was the sentence imposed on George Wilson, convicted bootlegger, who came before the magistrate in the city police court today. This fine is the largest imposed since the ETAOINNNTN imposed since the Temperance act came into force.

JAPS SAVED BRITISH TRANSPORTS.

Togio, Jan. 5.—Enemy submarines which attempted to attack British transports, convoyed by Japanese warships in the Mediterranean on December 30 were repulsed says an announcement from the Japanese admiralty. The warships were not damaged.

CANADIAN RAILWAY MEN WIPED OUT PARTY OF HUNS

Ottawa, Jan. 5.—Against the furious counter-attacks which the Huns made in the Cambrai sector, some Canadian railway played a minor but very heroic part. In the scramble at Gouzou-bits, with picks and shovels against rifles and machine guns, and for a time the Canadian shovel brigades held its own. One of the railwaymen grading a level crossing of a line on the morning of the attack, casually looked up from his work, to find four Germans with rifles bearing down on his party. He gave one yell to his comrades and, dashing for the Huns, armed only with his pick, killed the first man, after parrying a bayonet thrust, and was beleaguering the others when his friends came up and wined out the party.

A week ago Sunday was the coldest day at St. John for 56 years.
