ENGLISHMEN WERE NOT REFUSED WORK

Special to The Leader. FORT WILLIAM, May 14.—Labor conditions at this place, so far as the employment of Englishmen, are much better than before for several years. There is plenty of work and plenty of men to be had and wages are just as good as they ever were in this district. At the C.P.R. freight sheds they have plenty of men and are beginning to sort out from the quantity of hand-laborers that have been retained from the rounders of the eastern provinces, which has gained some credence in England, that a party of Englishmen from Ipswich had been refused work in Port Arthur, entirely on the grounds that a party of Englishmen came to Port Arthur to work on the G.P.R. railway, but on arrival it was found that the men were not capable of doing the work the company wanted them to do, which was rock work under contract to Foley Bros and Larson. The matter was taken up by Immigration Agent Burns and work was found for everyone of the 24 men. Representatives of the Great Train Road both emphatically deny that the men were refused work at all and say that they could have been given work as common laborers but they preferred to remain in Port Arthur.

WHEAT MARKET

CHICAGO, May 14.—A recurrence of yesterday's frenzied excitement characterized the initial transactions on the board of trade today, but opening quotations showed a much narrower range than did the first quotations of the previous session. The tendency at the start was toward higher prices, but enormous realising sales quickly carried prices down from 1 cent to 3 cents per bushel. From 8 1/4 to 8 3/4, the opening prices on July, the price dropped back to 8 1/4. September opened at 8 3/4 to 8 1/2, December said off to 8 3/4, after opening at 8 1/2 to 8 3/4.

EUROPEAN WHEAT MARKETS BUK

Special to The Leader. LONDON, May 14.—The European wheat situation has resolved itself into a question of supply and demand. Germany has long been buying from Australia and Argentina to replace the wheat lost to Russia last fall. The wheat sold to Russia last fall, the damage done to winter wheat in Germany, Roumania, Hungary and along the Danube is largely responsible for the advance in prices. Cold weather in Great Britain also helped the advance. Prices at Liverpool were lower while the markets at Paris and Berlin were quiet.
