His feet and arms bear the terrible marks where the drawn ropes cut into his flesh. His tongue is one solid bilster, seared by acid and red hot irons, while over his body are burns inflicted by lighted candles. Yesterday his condition was extremely critical, and he will probably die without being able to throw any further light upon his case, denounced by the authorities as the most outrageous since the dark ages.

DULMAGE TELLS HIS OWN STORY

Serious Aspect of Wheatley Whitecapping Affair Revealed in County Court

Witnesses Who Have Weak Eyesight -Mr. Lewis Offering Vigorous Defence.

The preliminary investigation of the Wheatley white-capping affair—so far as it has proceeded—goes to corroborate the first and most serious story which was given to the public. Dulmage, who is a tall, slight man of rather prepossessing appearance, under the solicitation of of Crown Attorney Smith, told an apparently straight story of the attack upon him and stuck to it throughout a vigorous cross-examination by Mr. Lewis. That the amination by Mr. Lewis. That the man was seized and soused and then whipped by four or five masked individuals and in the presence of quite a gathering seems established, but the Crown is apparently going to have some difficulty in getting at the guilty parties. Witnesses were woefully blind and seem totally unable to locate the identity of those who assisted in what the Crown Attorney sarcastically designated "the Dulmage celebration."

The case opened before Judge Houston in County Court at 11.30 this morning, Crown Attorney Smith prosecuting and O. L. Lewis defending the accused.

The information charges that Wm. J. Martin, Wm. Tremblay (constable), James McDonald, Wm. Mills, Ewart Gibson, Wm. Curtis and Oscar Lounsbury did assemble with intent to do bodily harm to one Thomas Dulmage and conducted themselves in such a manner as to disturb the peace tumultuously.

The defendants had all pleaded not guilty.

Thomas S. Dulmage, of Wheatley, man was seized and soused and then

Thomas S. Dulmage, of Wheatley, gave evidence that on the night in question about ten o'clock he was jumped on by a number of men who carried him over behind the blacksmith's shop and gave him "a good ducking." They first threw two or three pails of water over him, then tied a rope round his chest and lowered him into the well. By seizing the side of the well he was prevented from going in head first. They pulled him up and let him don't three times. He was then hauled out They pulled him up and let him down three times. He was then hauled out and the men went at him with several whips and he was struck all over the body 50 or 60 times. He sought to protect his face, but it was struck too. After they got through beating him they loosened the rope and disappeared. The men all wore masks, between 10 and 15 of them took part. He was marked severely from the whipping. The men did not say why they were doing it. Dulmage recognized only one positively. He was Ewart Gibson. There were two he thought were Oscar Lounsbury and James McDonald by their general appearance. The Crown Attorney tendered Dulmage's and Mrs. Dulmage's denial of the rumor that he had in any way abused his wife. It was not admitted.

Cross-examined by Mr. Lewis, Dul Cross-examined by Mr. Lewis, Dulmage said that there had been no ill will between himself and the men he mentioned. He was perfectly sober, although he had taken a couple of glasses of whiskey in the morning and about four glasses of beer. He admitted papers had been posted against him by "meddling parties," not nis wife.

Evidence as to his habit of drinking was ruled out by the Court.

Witness said he had received no

Witness said he had received no permanent injury.

Mr. Lewis asked if Percy Gahan had given the names of the accused to the Crown. The question was disallowed by the Court.

Chloe Dulmage, wife of Thomas Dulmage, was the next witness. She heard the trouble on the night in question and first heard Dulmage cry, "Don't strike me in the face." She was frightened and left the house. She said she knew something was going to happen to her husband. Someone told her, but she did not know who. She was much excited and frightened. Dulmage had been drinking that day but had been somewhat straightened up. Epplett was the man who had told her about it.

Dr. J. A. Campbell saw some men come from the direction of Dulmage's store. There were about 15 or 20 of them. The men ahead were carrying comething and the others followed up. They stopped behind the black-smith shop. Not a word was said. He saw some men masked. Dulmage was on the ground, He recognized in was on the ground. He recognized in the crowd Lounsbury, Curtis, Samuel Reek, Wm. Rogers, Nathaniel Cole. The witness then heard water being poured, then there was a struggle at the well. Dulmage fought to keep out. Witness moved further from the well. He heard them sousing him in the well. There were "just four or five" using whips on him. He didn't make any murmur. One man struck him hard, and I said it should be stopped. Reeve Fox told witness that he was there.

Witness, continuing, said Lounsbury had no mask on when he saw him, and was not then taking any part in it. Wm. Curtis was mot masked either.

Reeve F. J. Fox, of Romney, was there and recognized Wm. Curtis and Horatio Mills, Witness went up to Dulmage. They had his coat and vest and hat off and poured water on him. He was close up, but did not know who did it. It was dark and nobody spoke. He stayed and watched them put him in the well. He resisted but they dropped him down. Witness did not interfere or say anything, although he was Reeve. Witness went away right after, but came back, He
