REV. G. F. BOLSTER NEW MODERATOR

Western Association of United Baptists in Annual Session—Large Number of Delegates Present

The annual meeting of the Western Association of United Baptists opened in Hartland Tuesday afternoon and continues until Thursday evening. About seventy-five delegates are in attendance from Victoria, Madawaska, Carleton, York, Sunbury and Queens Counties.

The first session opened yesterday afternoon in the United Baptist church at 2.30. Devotional, led by Rev. E. J. Barass, of Marysville. At 3.15 an interesting paper on "The Bible Viewpoint" was read by Rev. Joseph Ainsworth of Majorville, followed by a very interesting discussion in which several of the delegates took part. At 4 o'clock a paper on Missions was read by Rev. G. F. Bolster, of the local church, and a report on Grand Lunge by T. B. Long. This report also received considerable discussion, led by Rev. I. A. Corbett, of Fredericton. At 5 p.m. the following committees were appointed:

The evening session opened at 7.30 when the associational sermon was preached by Rev. J. E. Gosline. Mr. Gosline took as his text, I Cor. 1:30, "Christ Our Redeemer", and emphasized very strongly the teachings of Christ and the Redemption of the World. Redemption touches personality, constitutes a new thing in history and a new birth re-attended. Special music was furnished at the evening service by the choir.

This morning at 9.30 the third session opened with Devotional, led by Rev. E. J. Barass. At 10 o'clock, report of the nominating committee and the following officers were elected for the ensuing year:
