HARTLAND, N. B., July 4—This has been a memorable day for Hartland. The grand public opening of the new bridge took place, and nearly 4,000 people came in from surrounding villages and the country-side. A grand procession was formed, and after marching around the village crossed over the new bridge to Victoria and returned. The procession was headed by S. S. Miller, secretary-treasurer of the company, as master of ceremonies, following was a bicycle procession with 20 nice-looking girls, then came a barouche carrying Premier Tweedie, members of the cabinet, the company's directors, local members and press representatives; also a long string of private carriages.

A platform had been erected at the end of the bridge and the visitors and friends seated themselves and gave interesting addresses. The bridge has already established itself as a necessity and people wonder how we ever got along without it. It increases trade 40 or 50 per cent. Tolls amounting to over \$\$\$ are taken daily. The cost of the structure was \$\$5,000.

The bridge connects three of the best-parishes in the country. Hartland looks for a large trade by the building of the new structure. The eastern or Hartland approach to the bridge is right off the main street of the village. There is a well built road with considerable elevation, which leads to the main road on the other side.

SCHOONER CUT IN TWO.

Run Into by Steamer--One Sailor Drown-ed as He Slept.

CHATHAM, N. B., July 4—The steamer Rupplingham, which arrived here to-day from Hull, England, reports being in collision with the American fishing schooner Wenonah, or Gloucester, about 35 miles off Cape Royal, Nidd. The accident occurred about 1 o'clock in the day. There was a heavy fog at the time.

Theschooner, which was about 78 tons register, was struck aft, her stern was completely cut off, and she sank almost immediately. The life boats were launched and the crew—19 in number—with one exception escaped from the doomed vessel. A sallor named Bushie, who was in his berth at the time, was drowned while he slept.

The steamer was stopped as quickly as possible and, by sounding her whistle, the men in the life boats were able to locate her after some time. They were all well cared for and brought into this port.

The fourth triennial Dominion convention of the International Order of King's Daughters opened yesterday morning at the King's Daughters' Guild, Prince William street, St. John, with a good attendance of delegates. Miss A. M. Brown, acting Dominion secretary, presided. After the usual religious exercises the roll was called. The delegates from Fredericton were Miss Jean Cooper, Miss Neill, Miss Sterling, Miss Ella Thorne, Miss Wiley, Miss Whitehead.

Miss Barker, recording secretary, did not go into detail in her report, as she said this would be done on New Brunswick day, July 9. St. John has progressed during the last four years. The membership has decreased from 357 to 156, but it is a paid membership. All over the province the decrease has been correspondingly great, due to the fact that all names not credited with a fee during the last three years were erased from the books which, of course, made a difference in membership. One hundred and seventy-three new names have been added since 1897. The total membership is 334, of which 17 are unpaid. In 1897 New Brunswick had 28 circles, today there are only 17. Leaders of several circles wrote that they had not held any meetings for some time and the circles have ceased to exist. There are some active good circles in this province and they are progressing splendidly.

Miss E. L. Thorne, of Fredericton, read a most interesting paper on the Power of Individual Life. It was listened to throughout with the deepest interest and at the close Miss Thorne was tendered a hearty vote of thanks. Miss Thorne's paper was discussed by several of the members in a bright clever manner, the principal points being talked of in an interesting way.
