NEW BRIDGE OVER MILL COVE.

Fine structure Erected During Past Year—Inspected And Accepted

MAKING NEW ROAD.

This is a handsome structure and was built by the Messrs Ruddock of Chatham.

The Chief Commissioner of Public Works, Hon. C. H. LaBrosse and engineer Wetmore were here Friday and inspected the structure and it was pronounced satisfactory in every respect.

The road approaching it from Newcastle is in a very unsatisfactory condition.

The contractor claims to have finished his contract. Yet it is hardly possible and government men are now engaged in placing it in proper condition. As soon as this is done the new bridge will be publicly and officially opened for traffic.

MANY PETITIONS RECEIVE ATTENTION.

Committees Report On Various Petitions and Discussions

ASSESSORS UPHELD

Committee on Petitions Sustains Assessors in Assessment of Companies.

The adjourned meeting of the Town Council was held Monday evening. There were present Mayor Miller and Alds Ritchie, Grenley, Russell, Desmond, Wyse, Williston, Lawlor and McMurdo.

Ald Wyse of the Police and Appointment Committee recommended that D. Sullivan be added to the list of lumber surveyors and John Jardine to constables. On a ballot being taken they were duly declared elected.

Mayor Miller read a copy of a communication which he had written to Mr. Loggie M. P. in reference to guns of the Newcastle Field Battery which he had been informed were to be sent to Charlottetown to ornament the Public Gardens. The communication asked that if they were to be so disposed of that Newcastle be permitted to retain them for its park.

Mr. Loggie had laid the matter before the Minister of Militia who stated that the guns when taken from here would be returned to stores for reuse.

Several communications from John Ferguson Esq in reference to discount on electric light bills of under one dollar were read. These were accompanied by receipts bills of June and July, 1904, which showed discount allowed.

Ald Lawlor of the Light and Water committee said his contention was that when a man such as Mr. Ferguson or any other person used the light at his home and place of business the full discount should be allowed on all bills whether the amount was under \$1.00 or not. If the allowing of this was contrary to any by-law he would move an amendment at next meeting.

Ald Desmond made the suggestion that the discount be allowed on the full amount at the close of each year.

Ald Williston—No doubt Mr. Lawlor referred to him. Yes he had always obtained the discount and did not think the town could collect full amount.

When the consumer had lights connected a contract with the town was signed agreeing to provide light at certain prices, with a certain discount if paid before a certain date. Surely the town should live up to its contracts just as a private individual is expected to. He did not think there was any by law restricting the giving of the discount if there was, consumers had not been so notified and until they were the old contract stands.

A petition signed by residents outside the Police and Fire district to the Northwest bridge asking that the electric light be extended to the Northwest bridge was read.

On motion of Ald McMurdo this petition was referred to the Water and Light committee to bring in a report and an estimate cost at next meeting.

Ald Lawlor of the Water and Light committee submitted the following report. TO HIS WORSHIP THE MAYOR AND ALDERMEN OF THE TOWN OF NEWCASTLE:—

Your light and water committee beg leave to submit the following report. Re the Petitions of J. W. Davidson, and others and Henry Ingram and others:—

We wish to refer to the full Council. Your committee may not have the necessary money to install the same, but we are of the opinion that such work should be done.

During the time Mr. Follansbee has been in charge of the Electric Light and pumping station he has given good satisfaction, and your committee would recommend his appointment.

DISASTROUS FIRE AT MILLERTON.

Miller Tanning Extract Company's Factory and Warehouse Burned.

LOSS ABOUT \$20,000.

Fire Raged Fiercely and Other Buildings Threatened But Saved.

Fire was discovered at an early hour Tuesday morning at the large factory of the Miller Tanning Extract Company at Millerton. The flames had gained considerable headway before being discovered and it was soon seen that the factory was doomed. Heroic efforts were made to save the adjacent warehouse and back piles but with the appliances at hand even this was not possible and the whole plant went up in smoke together with a large quantity of extract stored in the warehouse and about three hundred ends of bark. This latter made a fiercely hot fire and is still burning.

The office of the company and surrounding buildings among which was the I. C. R. Station house and freight shed had a narrow escape, but were saved after hard work.

The loss will be in the vicinity of \$20,000 partly covered by insurance.

The Newcastle fire engine and a quantity of hose was sent up and did good work.

How the fire originated is not known. The factory had been closed down since Saturday for repairs and a number of men were engaged in excavating for a addition which was about to be constructed. It is not known whether this factory will be rebuilt or not as this will be settled by the managers in London.
