City Engineer Barrow was waited upon this morning by a deputation which is anxious to have a sewer constructed on Garth street, south of Aberdeen avenue. The street is the dividing line between the city and county but Mr. Barrow was assured that he will prepare an estimate and will have a petition presented in the usual way.

This morning City Engineer Barrow went to the Works department to investigate the complaint about employees doing plumbing jobs while out at their work, and receiving pay therefor. He found that there was little cause for complaint, although some of the men had done such work as putting on washers, etc. for friends. He notified them all that nothing of that sort must be done in the future.

The question of water supply for the Hamilton Scimitar has been brought before the City Engineer by Mr. Southam, the secretary. A connection via the Asylum pipe has been suggested. Mr. Barrow will look carefully into the matter and report.

CASE STANDS FOR ONE WEEK.

Hearing of O'Dowd Case Did Not Come on To-day. Hildreth and Barclay Were Acquitted This Morning.

When the case of Thomas P. O'Dowd, the alleged defaulting financial secretary of the local Cigar Makers' Union, was called at the Police Court this morning, M. J. O'Reilly, counsel for the prisoner, said that he was not ready to go on with the case, and a remand till next Monday was granted.

The charge of burglary against William Hildreth and Jno. Barclay was taken up this morning, but the case against them was so weak that their lawyer, M. J. O'Reilly, picked it all to pieces with a few words. The only evidence sworn to by witnesses was that the defendants were in the Simcoe House on the night of the 18th, and that when the detectives went to Barclay's house some whiskey was found. It was shown by the prisoner's counsel that this particular brand of whiskey was sold at nearly every saloon in town, and the prisoners were discharged.

Richard Jones, the man with the three suits of clothes and all the overcoats, was taken up this morning, after a week's baths at the castle. Michael Gallagher, 42 Wellington street north; Charles Scott, 1434 King street east; Fred Scully, Newmarket, and Leonard Martin, 327 Wentworth street north, were all so full when arrested that they could say nothing but "Corby." The first two were discharged, and the last two were fined \$2 each.

FOR DEAF MUTES. SPECIAL CELEBRATION OF HOLY COMMUNION AT ALL SAINTS'. Yesterday Canon Forrester had a special celebration of the holy communion in All Saints' Church for a party of fifteen deaf mutes, resident in the city and vicinity. The service was arranged for by a lady and gentleman of Toronto who are interested in ministering to deaf mutes throughout the district. The communion office was read slowly by Canon Forrester, and interpreted in sign language by the lady, to the communicants, standing in the front pew, and watching her movements most intently and reverently. All joined in the Lord's prayer in the sign language. At the close of the service Canon Forrester addressed a few words of welcome to the worshippers, who seemed greatly to enjoy the service and the pastor's greeting. The service was private, and had a dozen outside visitors being present.

SMALL FIRES. DEPARTMENT HAS BEEN KEPT BUSY SINCE SATURDAY. The Fire Department has been kept busy since Saturday. Besides the big blaze at the Toronto & Hamilton Sewer Co.'s works early this morning, two alarms were responded to on Saturday and one yesterday. A spark from a chimney, probably from a passing engine, set fire to the roof of the residence of Mrs. W. Ralph, 270 Hunter street west, on Saturday afternoon. Neighbors succeeded in getting the most of the furniture out before the flames spread. The top portion of the house was badly damaged, the firemen having a hard time to get at the fire in the attic. Loss estimated at \$200.

MR. BETRAM'S WILL. DUNDAS MANUFACTURER LEFT AN ESTATE VALUED AT \$50,000. The will of the late Mr. John Betram, of Dundas, was entered for probate at the Surrogate Court this morning. The estate is valued at \$49,629, consisting of life insurance, \$30,000; stock, \$35,900; cash in bank, \$285; personal property, \$2,444. The executors of the estate are Rev. John H. Hamilton and Mr. Peter H. Davidson. It is to be divided between Mrs. J. Sterling, then deceased, Messrs. Thos. A., Jas. B., Henry, and Alex. Bertram, sons; Marsden and Betram Sterling, grandsons.

JAMES G. DAVIS WELL. NO TRUTH IN REPORT ABOUT HIS SERIOUS ILLNESS. Mr. James Gage Davis was the least surprised man in the city when he learned through the medium of one of the papers in the city that he was seriously ill and that his physician "thinks he will gradually sleep away." His many friends who saw him up town on Saturday did not think he was walking in his sleep, and several pieces of evidence over the report, called on him at his home, Main street east, yesterday were pleased to have him receive them in person at the day's end, that he is feeling real well for a man of over 85.

CHICAGO CITY HALL. FEARS THAT THE WHOLE BUILDING MAY TUMBLE DOWN. Chicago, April 30.—Chicago's City Hall has settled to such an extent since the completion of the excavation for the adjoining new county building that it was found necessary yesterday to rope in the entrances to prevent pedestrians from being killed by the falling sections of copings and cornices. At the south end the building is settling on the foundations have sunk several inches, while the entire building has assumed a list in the direction of the hole which the new building will cover. During the day several pieces of stone fell and two employees narrowly escaped being killed as they were entering the building.

HIS THROAT SLASHED. WOUNDS ARE BELIEVED TO HAVE BEEN SELF-INFLICTED. Late on Saturday night, a man, about 30 years of age, who comes from Brockville, and claims the name of George Stacey, presented himself at the St. Joseph's Hospital, with two large-sized gashes in his throat. He didn't seem to know how it happened as he told two or three stories, and the police, who were called to the scene, found the wounds to be self-inflicted. One of his stories confirmed that opinion but another story told by him was that he had been attacked. It is said that Stacey had attempted suicide before.

APPOINTED GUARDIAN. DOROTHY HUNTING'S APPLICATION GRANTED BY JUDGE TO-DAY. This morning Dorothy Hunting, the divorced wife of the late Peter Ellman, was, on the application of her solicitor, Mr. A. C. Beasley, appointed by the Judge, guardian of her four-year-old son, Jack Ellman. The lad receives \$200, half the amount of an insurance policy on the life of his father. The other half goes to the dead man's mother. Dorothy Hunting is in the city to-day and will leave for New York to-morrow.

IRON MOULDERS' CASE. The committee appointed by the Iron Moulders' Union to confer with the stove manufacturers reported at a special meeting of the union, held in the Maccafee's Hall. They reported that the foundrymen would not consider any request for an increase and were in earnest in asking for a slight reduction on same classes of work. The committee was authorized to make terms with the manufacturers, but not to accept any reduction. The old agreement expires to-morrow.
