MINE CAVE-IN.

Four Men Thought to be Killed—Several Hurt.

Birmingham, Ala., Oct. 4.—An explosion of gas occurred in mine No. 7, of the Tennessee Coal, Iron & Railroad Co., at Pratt City, this morning, and a cave-in of the roof followed. Four miners, including the bank boss, were caught behind the cave-in and are believed to be dead. A number of injured were taken out and removed to hospitals.

ALLEY DISPUTE.

Terms Will Likely be Passed Upon To-morrow.

The alley dispute between H. B. Whipple, J. Finlayson and H. Grierson and the Terminal Station Company has not been definitely settled as yet. Mr. W. S. McBrayne, solicitor for Messrs. Finlayson and Grierson, has not been able to arrange things to his satisfaction, and the case was adjourned till to-morrow at 10 o'clock. Mr. F. S. Morrison, for Mr. Whipple, announced that he was satisfied with the terms, and the only thing that is wanted to make the deal go through, is the approval of Messrs. Finlayson and Grierson. It will likely be settled to-morrow morning.

JAPAN RICE CROP.

Tokio, Oct. 4.—The final official forecast of this year's rice crop shows it to be 13.1% above the average.
