WARDEN GARLETT

Reeve Charles Edward Garlete of Beamsville, the new warden of Lincoln County, has been a resident of Canada for the past thirty-five years, and he says he has found it the best country to live in under the sun. He came to Canada in 1885, the year Louis Reil was in the spotlight with his Northwest Rebellon.

Being an Englsihman, and inspired by the Englishman's desire to help out in an emergency, I thought I'd run over to Canada and kill a few Indians who were fighting against the Canadian forces," said Mr. Garlett. "Unfoltunately or otherwise, when I got here I found the rebellon was over. They had caught Reil."

Mr. Garlett has lived in Beamsville and vicinity for fourteen years, and since 1891 has been employed by Senator E.D. Smith. He was born in England in 1869, is an Anglican, and has a wife and two children, his son being a teller in a bank, and his daughter at home. He has had eight years' municipal experience, four in the County Council as Reeve of Beamsville, and the other four as a Beamsville Councillor.
