S. Jenkins, M.A., Receiving Con-
gratulations of the Citizens Upon
His Election—A Man of Scholarly
Attainments in Strathcona's Re-
presentative.

Citizens of Strathcona yesterday
shared the pleasure of the election of
a man of the highest calibre to the
honour of the position of M.P. for
Strathcona. S. Jenkins, M.A., as a
member of the Senate of Alberta
University, has been elected to the
House of Commons. Mr. Jenkins stands in the front rank
and his selection by the Alberta con-
vention is a tribute to his able
conduct of his duties as M.P. for
Strathcona in the House of Com-
mons in the city of Strathcona.

Mr. Jenkins graduated from the
University of Toronto with the de-
gree of B.A. in 1933, winning the
University of Toronto medal as a
specialist in modern languages. He
also specialized in classics and in
1936 received his M.A. from the
University of Toronto. He has re-
ceived his Master of Arts degree from
Toronto University. Immediately

travel and study in Europe and on his first trip he was accompanied by his wife, who is also a Master of Arts from the University of Toronto. In his modern languages, French and Italian they went and are enjoying their studies immensely, until Mrs. Jenkins' health failed and they were obliged to return. Her doctor recommended the invigorating climate of Alberta, and thither they came about three years ago. Mr. Jenkins receiving an appointment in the University of Alberta as Latin teacher, and here Mrs. Jenkins rapidly recovered her health. Further regarding Mr. Jenkins' experience as an educator, he has been an examiner for the Educational Department of Ontario in French and German for university matriculation and high school work.

In the subject of the attainments of a linguist he holds high rank as a student of English and has done some notable literary work.

He is the author of a book of poems published in 1933 by the well-known firm of William Briggs, Toronto, entitled "Verses of the New Century." Available in German verse. He has also been a frequent contributor to educational journals both in Canada and abroad. Several of his articles have appeared in German Teaching in Ontario.
