




SAY PRISONERS.

German Artillery Failed to Acc plish Task of Silencing the Fre Batteries.

Paris, Jan. 12 .--- The Germans more than 25,000 men in the Su laughts again Champagne, according to Cha despatches to-day, which describe battle as the bloodiest on the wes front since the allied offensive September. Great numbers of wounded Ger prisoners have reached Chalons. confirm the report that General Eimen planned to break through French line and bend back the wi front from Rheims to Verdun. The prisoners complained that t German artillery failed to do work. Instead of silencing French batteries, the German gu only wrecked portions of advance French trenches. The heavy bo bardment lasting for nearly twent four hours, gave ample time for French to hurry up reserves to m the attack. Asphyxiating gas shells forced French to retire from several advan ed positions before the German charged. The first rush of the Ter tons carried them into the French first-line trenches, but their ranks were riddled when they attempted t push on. Without giving the enemy time fortify the newly conquered po tions, the French swept forward in a dashing charge that regained practically all the lost ground. Hunderds of bodies of German so liers were found in the first-line works, and between the first and second-line trenches. Among the German prisoners reaching Chalons were a number of oldiers belonging to the Imperial Guard.






