"On the night of the 4th we ighted a steamer and signalled to her some hours later she came along-The weather was too bad for us side. The weather was too bad for us to leave our vessel and during that night we were forced to remain on our water-logged ship, the steamer standing alongside. In the morning we were rescued and before leaving the ship I set her on fire. The last we saw of the ship she was in flames." Capt. Legge said that he lost every-thing except the clothes he wore.
