The Unspeakable Turk.

Fiendish Outrages Perpetrated on Greek Population—Nationalists Urge Boycott of Allies—Poles Fleeing Before Bolsheviks—Toronto Yachtsman May Replace Burton—Archbishop of Melbourne is Source of Trouble to British Government.

GREEKS SLAUGHTERED BY TURKS.

CONSTANTINOPLE, July 19. The British and Greeks are preparing to clear the Scutari Peninsula of all Nationalists and establish a line from Ismid to Chilik on the Black Sea, which would control bandits and against Bosphorus towns and check communications between Ankara and Constantinople through the Scutari Peninsula. General Inland of the British forces, probably will command the troops. Turkish Nationalists continue to raid Greek villages on the south shore of the Gulf of Ismid. The Greek Patriarch reports that Fouadlik, a Greek village with a population of two thousand near Karamorsal, was virtually wiped out July fifteenth. The Greeks were shut into a Church which was set on fire. The Patriarch reports that there are only one burned and fifty Greeks alive in the village.

MAY SUCCEED BURTON.

NEW YORK, July 19. Amelius Jarvis, of Toronto, may succeed Burton as skipper of the Shamrock, according to the New York Times.

URGES BOYCOTT AGAINST ALLIES.

CONSTANTINOPLE, July 19. A circular has been posted on the walls of Stamboul urging boycott against the powers forcing the

treaty upon Turkey. It exhorts all Mussulmans to arm themselves with pistols, clubs and hatchets and drive out the "weak leaders who yield to the demands of foreigners who are seeking to diminish Moslem power."

TURKISH CABINET MAY RESIGN.

CONSTANTINOPLE, July 19. Djemal Pasha, Minister of Public Works, and Fahreddine Bay, Minister of Education, who were both members of the Turkish Peace Delegation, resigned from the Cabinet to-day. The prospect is that the entire Cabinet will resign because of a row over the Peace Treaty.

RESENT FRENCH MANDATE.

LONDON, July 19. General mobilization is ordered in Syria in reply to the French ultimatum to King Faisal that he acquiesce in the French mandate for Syria, according to a Times despatch from Jerusalem.

TENSE SITUATION IN SYRIA.

BEIRUT, Syria, July 19. The Bedouin tribes of Northern Mesopotamia have formed a coalition against the French, while Prince Faisal, head of the Syrian State, is endeavoring to organize the bandits west of Aleppo to a movement against the French. Clashes between Arabs and French are expected any day and the situation is tense. The Lebanon Legion

lative Assembly is reported to have agreed secretly with Faisal that autonomous Lebanon shall be a part of the Syrian kingdom.

LIDA OCCUPIED BY BOLSHEVIKS.

WARSAW, July 19. The occupation of Lida near Vilna, by the Bolsheviks after heavy fighting is reported by the War Office here to-day.

POLES WITHDRAWING.

WARSAW, July 19. The Poles are withdrawing from the south and southwest from the railway junction of Lida, which has been occupied by the Bolsheviks in their drive in the direction of Gradow. This Bolshevik sweep across Lithuania, is giving the Soviet forces possession of a rich harvest, as they are occupying thousands of acres planted by the Poles with grain and hay now standing in stacks. The Polish population is fleeing before the Bolshevik onrush, the peasants crowding the roads with their livestock and vehicles loaded with household goods. It is said in Polish quarters that the retreat on the northern front is being continued in an orderly way according to plan.

RUSSIA WILL MAKE PEACE.

LONDON, July 19. The British Government to-day received a note from the Russian Soviet stating Russia was prepared to agree to an armistice and to make peace with Poland.

THE CORK CASUALTIES.

CORK, July 19. The casualties reported this morning total one dead, fourteen wounded. The firing, which was participated in, it is stated, by military patrols in motor lorries and armored cars, caused consternation. Frightened women and children hurried into side streets and doorways and knocked frantically at numerous houses for admission. Volunteer patrols hurried to their assistance, but several young girls and former soldiers already had been hit by flying bullets and were taken to hospital. The street was quiet after midnight.

BUT NOT A SMALL PRICE.

ST. JOHN, N.B., July 19. A small consignment of last year's potato crop sold at five dollars and forty cents a bushel.

SUGAR.

OTTAWA, July 19. The export of sugar from Canada to the United States is under close attention by the Board of Commerce, according to a statement issued Saturday and steps are in contemplation which without drastic interference with trade conditions may be expected to reduce such transactions to a minimum.

LIES NEAR HUSBAND AND SON.

FARNBOROUGH, England, July 19. The remains of Empress Eugenie, with an impressive ceremony, were placed yesterday in the crypt of St. Michael's Chapel beside the resting place of Napoleon third and the Prince Imperial.

'TIS MUCH HIGHER HERE.

HALIFAX, July 19. Sugar is retailing in the vicinity of twenty-five cents a pound here. The wholesale price announced Saturday by the Acadia Sugar Company was twenty-four dollars and ten cents per hundred pounds.

MAY BAR ARCHBISHOP.

LONDON, July 19. The question as to whether Most Rev. Daniel Mannix, Archbishop of Melbourne, Australia, shall be barred from Ireland in view of his recent utterances in the United States, is under consideration by the British Government. This statement was made by Bonar Law, Government spokesman, in the House of Commons to-day, in answer to a question as to whether the Government would not prevent Archbishop Mannix from visiting Ireland, because his presence and speeches might be likely to increase difficulties already existing.

MILLIONAIRE FARM HAND.

BOYLSTON, Mass., July 19. David Nicholl Cant, a farm hand, has been identified as an heir to a million dollar estate in Dundee, Scotland.

BURTON GETS ANOTHER CHANCE.

Rotten Mail Service.

Editor Evening Telegram.

Dear Sir.—How long will the people of Bonavista District have to endure that intolerable yacht "Carmen"? There never has been such bungling and incompetency, to say nothing of gross neglect, since this Bay has had a representative in parliament. Surely the Government must have set out to enrich the owners of this contemptible little ship or else they would never have chartered her, or, on the other hand, they would have handed her over immediately they saw how utterly unfit she was for the work. No one ever knows when she will appear or what ports will be skipped. The first mail dispatched from St. John's is the last to be received. What is wrong with the Minister of posts? Must mails go out to connect with the "Carmen" which seldom gets anywhere. When he knows the condition of things why doesn't he send our mails by "Prospero," "Susan," and the Wesleyville motor boat alone. These boats arrive regularly. Or better still, have the motor boat to run twice a week in Gumbo as was done before the "Carmen" was put on the Bay. Bonavista itself is served by train, therefore honest John is satisfied; Port Union is the second city and W. F. Coaker is satisfied; but what is Mr. Winsor doing for his side of the Bay. We cannot expect much from him, for a more incompetent representative never sat in parliament. He is ever on the alert to find jobs for people more incompetent than himself, and to get down with the proletariat and listen to the prattle of Bob, who imagines that Jim, who supported the other Government, got twenty cents more than has been accounted for.

I would say to Mr. Coaker that even his friends feel a bit out with him, and hard as they may try to conceal their displeasure, it is very evident that they are extremely unsatisfied with the manner in which he treats his district.

Every district in the country is treated better than this one, and I suppose for this reason. Mr. Morine held Bonavista spell bound for a quarter of a century. Government's might come and governments might go, but Mr. Morine seemed to go on for ever—but he didn't. But whatever he did, he did nothing wrong in the eyes of his district, and however glaring might be his failure, Bonavista would not see it. Mr. Coaker knows all this and says to himself, "I'll hypnotise my district like Morine did, and then I'll just do what I like and treat them as I please, and however dastardly I behave towards them, I'll never do wrong in their eyes. I'll go on, not for ever, but just long enough to satisfy all my ambitions, and then Morine's fate will be mine. There is one thing that can be said in Mr. Morine's favor, he always stood by his district, every part of it, and was kind and considerate to foe as well as friend, and although I could never persuade myself to vote for him, yet I always admired him, and I am sure if he were our representative, even in the Opposition, the Government would think twice before they would allow this district to be so neglected. We sigh for the days of the old "Rimouski" and Capt. Brown, the "Dundee," captained by Blandford and Blackmore, when twice weekly for the greater part of the season they made their ports as regularly as the trains. But now we have gone back over twenty years. Whilst the war was on we were patient, but now matters are ten times worse than they were then and we must set a limit to our patience. As for Mr. Squires, we know he has very little to say in the Government. He may or may not be as his master said, a "black rascal," but we know he is piling up a good sum of money for services rendered, and as they are all trying to make as much hay as they can while the sun shines, of course the master allows it to go on, besides after all he cannot very well do without him. What a farce his manifesto was. Will we ever get decent patriotic government?
