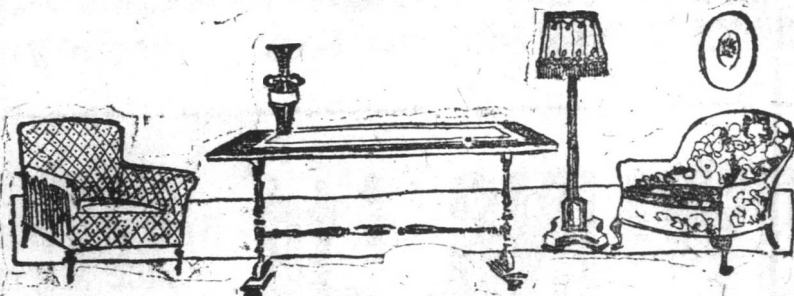

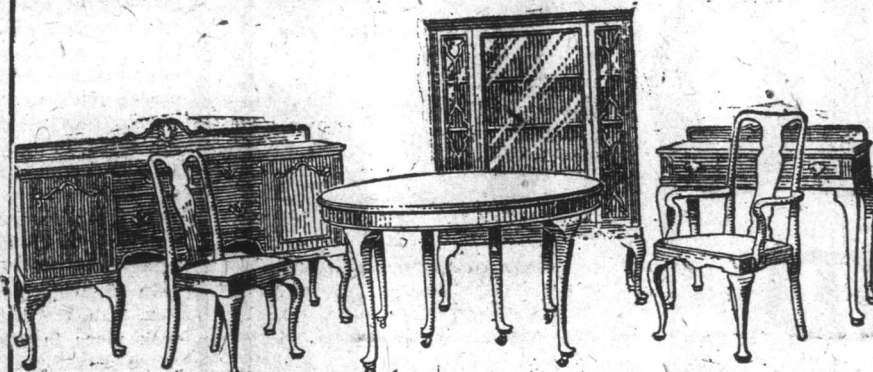

The Advocate Rattled.

The a-MEWS-ing editor of Newfoundland's premier comic journal, was in his element last night. Lightning flashed from his pen and thunder was in the air. At last, he had his dreaded enemy in his grasp, at last he had gained a long awaited opportunity of which he intended to take full advantage. The fact that he was publishing broad-cast a deliberate falsehood, a base, scurrilous lie, did not affect his conscience, for the simple reason that he does not possess one. He was the incarnation of G. K. Chesterton—in the flesh—and he would make the welkin ring with his denunciation of the Telegram. The people of Newfoundland would be shown what a terrible paper they had in their midst. Yes, undoubtedly, the editor of the Advocate was not in the grip of the pensive muse. Now was the time to strike, now was the time to bring his enemy to earth. So the Telegram calls the people of Bonavista—d—d fools! Well, brother Mews, the Telegram didn't. But the Telegram did repeat what a native of Bonavista said about Coaker's supporters, and we have no hesitation in announcing that we heartily agree with him. As the fiery editor of the "Rag of Newfoundland" permed his fierce editorial, how the sweat must have poured off his body. Repeating himself with the monotonous regularity of a MEWS-ical box, he poured out a torrent of personal abuse which has never been equalled, even by previous effusions of his own. So the Convention now in session at Port Union will not hesitate to condemn the Telegram for its vulgar abuse. This statement leaves us cold. 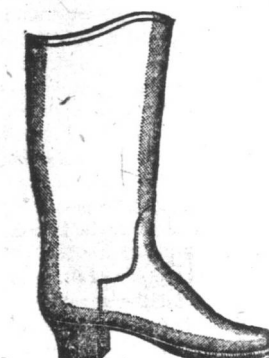

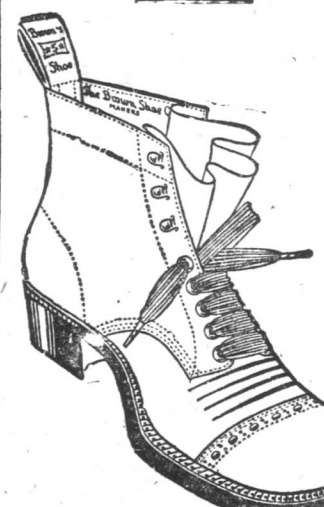
