Repacks in the Baltic

WORST IN MANY YEARS.

KIEL, Germany.—(A.P.)—Ships in the Baltic Sea traffic had such trouble with ice in February, and were frozen in so often, that many of them were ready to believe the climate of the Arctic had shifted. The German warship Braunschweig, which has just returned to this port after weeks of work in relieving icebound steamers, was the only craft able to cope with the unusually heavy ice.

The ice was too much at times for the ferry service between Sassnitz, on the Island of Rugen, and Sweden, and the traffic had to be transferred to Denmark. One of the big ferries, which carried an entire passenger train became hopelessly enmeshed in a great icefield. The wind was driving the ice pack towards the rocks and when the Braunschweig answered the wireless calls and cut the ferry boat loose before she grounded.

At times the Braunschweig cut out as many as 20 steamers in 12 hours. British, Norwegian, Swedish, Danish, Russian, Finnish, Latvian and Estonian ships were rescued. Some-

times the ships were frozen in for several days and their crews were out of provisions before help reached them.

The Blind Vicar

HOW GREAT HANDICAP IS OVERCOME.

After being curate-in-charge for nine years, the Rev. George Frerey Whittleton has just been nominated first vicar of the new parish of St. Jude's, Thornton Heath, near Croydon. He is one of the most remarkable personalities in the Church of England, for he has been blind from childhood. "The only help I require," he remarked the other day, "is that of a secretary, who will read to me and attend to my correspondence. My wife generally acts as my secretary. When I preach away from my own parish, which is not very often, I get someone to assist me into the pulpit, but I know my own church as well as I know this room." And the blind vicar turned his face round in the direction of the four walls of his study where his sermons are prepared, and in which he uses an ordinary typewriter. In the celebration of Holy Communion he is helped by the sidesmen. It is the duty of one of them to tell him how many people will be present for Communion, and so he knows how much bread and wine must be consecrated. When Mr. Whittleton first came to Thornton Heath, he told his congregation that he would

Not Be Able To See Them next time he met them, and they must greet him in the street. This plan has worked admirably, and the parishioners have always let their blind vicar know when he is approaching them. Before he came to Thornton Heath, and while he was still at Plumstead, his father made for him a relief map of his new parish. Thus the blind clergyman was able to familiarize himself with the streets, and when he arrived in Thornton Heath he found his way from the station to his rooms unaccompanied. Mr. Whittleton lost his sight when quite a child. He was born in the West Indies, and at the age of 14 was sent to the Royal Normal College, Norwood to become a teacher of the
