New York, Oct. 8. - De la C. C. W. of Jersey City, one of the wealthiest capitalists of New Jersey, has been adjudged bankrupt.

London, Oct. 8. - Two miners were arrested by the police of Camborne, in Cornwall, yesterday. Towards the evening a mob of several thousand miners attempted a rescue, and attacked and brutally treated the police.
