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WESTERN ONTARIO.

BROCK. M. P. Harrington was walking home from Hepworth along the county line, when he was met by a large wildcat. After passing the animal turned and started to follow him, and as a safeguard Mr. Harrington drew a small 22 caliber revolver. In passing the weapon from his pocket it was accidentally discharged, the ball entering his leg above the thigh. The noise from the discharged revolver frightened the animal away, and Mr. Harrington started for home, where he arrived almost exhausted from loss of blood.

The annual convention of the Christian Endeavor Societies of Grey and Bruce was held last week in Warton.

BRANT. J. H. Young, the T. H. and B. professor and his lawyer, Mr. Carson, were in Brantford on Friday and before they left in the evening they were treated to an unpleasant surprise, in the shape of a writ for \$45,000, served upon them at the station. In addition to this claim the R. W. and L. E. directors have secured the \$40,000 forfeit from Mr. Young, and about \$15,000 worth of rolling stock.

Brown & Baker, Brantford have effected a satisfactory settlement with their creditors.

Sylvester Misoner, Jersey Settlement, died on Sept. 10, aged 56 years. An early settler.

Herbert Yates, C. E., Brantford, has forwarded to the Montreal authorities the map of the survey for the loop line to connect with the main line at Lynden from Brantford.

A wild cat, shipped to Walsh Bros., of Brantford, escaped from his box and ran down one of the streets in that city. The ferocious animal is still at large.

SUFFERIN. On Thursday morning Patrick Ward, of Mount Forest, was found by his aged mother lying dead at the back door of his residence on Ferguson street. The body was cold and stiff. Deceased had for years been a sufferer with asthma.

S. Donner, the merchant who was recently fined \$2 and costs in Orangeville for an infraction of the early closing by-law, declines to pay his fine and declares emphatically that he will fight the town to the bitter end if an attempt is made to collect it.

The new town bell at Orangeville weighs about one ton, without the ringing apparatus, and the duty makes its total cost about \$600.

ELGIN. Alma College, St. Thomas, has the largest attendance this term it has had at the commencement of any term since its establishment.

Mrs. Mary Jane Overholt, of St. Thomas, died on Friday at the advanced age of 89 years. The deceased had lived for many years in that city, and was twice married.

C. Wilson & Son, of Ontario, sailed Monday, having entered an action against St. Thomas to recover an account of \$34.75, which the city refused to pay.

The plaintiffs put in a pair of scales at the St. Andrew's market, which were put up so close to the building that a load of hay could not be weighed upon them. Changes were made, which the city claims should be at the expense of the contractors.

LAMARCA. Three tenders for the purchase of the Sarnia Oil Company's property, consisting of refinery, machinery and pipe line, were opened on Saturday afternoon by the liquidator in the presence of Judge Macdonald, an order for the peremptory sale of the property having been made in the case of Alger vs. Sarnia Oil Company. The tenders were as follows: J. S. Nesbitt, \$2,000; Geo. Alger, \$10,000; J. L. Englehardt, \$10,015. The value of the property is about \$150,000.

The arrangements for the opening of the tunnel are as follows: "Special trains will carry the guests through the tunnel before the banquet, which will be at 2 p.m. in the Grand Trunk freight shed. After the trains have all passed through with the invited guests the tunnel will be open to the general public. Entrance will be made at the Canadian side of the river and exit made into United States territory, the crowds returning on the feet of Judge Macdonald. The Ontario Government has appointed David Mackenzie, of Sarnia, a notary public.

NORTHERN TOWNSHIPS. D. F. Burk, president of the Ontario and Albany River Railway, has made a proposal to operate a rapid transit service over his railway without any charge or bonus from Port Arthur except the usual fares.

Peter Young, the discoverer of the now celebrated Climax silver mine, has sold his one-eighth interest.

C. B. Kirkland, formerly of the Beaver mine at Port Arthur, and brother of F. S. Kirkland, of timber limit fame, died recently in Mexico.

OXFORD. Mrs. Donald Paterson, of East Nisour, mother of C. R. Paterson, of Ingersoll, has received notice of her husband to the estate of her late uncle, Colin Reid, Inverness, Scotland. The estate is said to be quite extensive.

The second and final dividend at the rate of 31 cents in the dollar has been declared in the estate of James F. McGoehie, trading under the style of McGoehie Bros., in Woodstock. The first dividend was at the rate of 20 cents in the dollar.

One day last week Daniel Hagey was driving in Blenheim when he noticed something crawling slowly across the road. On reaching it he discovered that it was a blowing adder, measuring nearly four feet in length and four inches in circumference. He picked up a stone and succeeded in killing the reptile before it had time to blow itself up. This is the third snake of this kind that has been killed in that neighborhood.

Andrew Carroll, West Zorra, aged 75 years, is dead, of cancer.

On Saturday, Herbert Reid, an 8-year-old lad, was thrown from a wagon near the C. P. R. station at Woodstock. One of the wheels of the heavily-loaded wagon ran over the little fellow, breaking his left arm at the shoulder, and badly cutting his left hand and also his face.

The United States Treasury Department has declined to grant the request of a Woodstock firm to hereafter import free horses used by them in lumber operations in Maine, notwithstanding that they have paid duty on the animals each year of their lives have sent them over.

While George H. McMillan, of Plattsburgh, in company with an assistant, were engaged on a movable platform painting the brickwork of the Imperial Hotel at New Hamburg, the book supporting the platform gave way, knocking the occupants to the sidewalk below. The assistant escaped with a few bruises, but Mr. McMillan was less fortunate, breaking both legs and left arm, besides sustaining internal injuries.

PERTH. A man named Roberts was kicked in the breast by a horse on Friday in Downville. He managed to make his way to the residence of Thomas Wilson, where he died from his injuries in the evening.

Rev. A. H. Drumm, of Avonorton, was married at Georgetown on Thursday. On

his arrival home a reception was tendered him by the congregation. Tea was served and an enjoyable time was spent. Excellent music was furnished by the choir.

H. F. Gadaway, B. A., Stratford, has gone to Pembroke to fill a position as classical master in the high school.

Fred Maurer, blacksmith, Eustock, is the last pass right victim. He lately signed a note for \$25 for the right to sell, manufacture, mend and use "Taylor & Judd's Reversible Harrow Tooth and Clip." The agent departing, he signed as he came. The note is made payable to bearer.

Robert Kennedy, Stratford, is the possessor of a pair of pure white twin calves. There is not a hair of any other color on them.

Miss May Macdonald, Stratford, daughter of Rev. D. G. Macdonald, has left to attend the Ladies' Medical College, Chicago. She contemplates fitting herself for missionary work in India.

P. Pelley, Arkell, has a prolific cow. Between Saturday and Sunday morning she gave birth to a calf. The cow was doing all right and the calf did not. On Monday morning the eyes of the good woman were more than wide open when he beheld another calf sucking the cow. She had given birth to it during the night.

WENTWORTH. George W. Johnston, head master of the Hamilton Central School, has been offered the appointment of master of the commercial course in Upper Canada College. He has accepted the offer, subject to the approval of the Hamilton Board of Education, with whom he is under contract. Mr. Johnston has been connected with the Hamilton schools for seventeen years.

Mrs. Emily T. McDonnell, of Port Huron, Mich., has commenced a suit against the Grand Trunk Railway for \$100,000 damages. On June 20, 1900, Mr. and Mrs. McDonnell were going to Niagara Falls. When near Copetown the parlor car jumped the track and rolled down an embankment. Mr. McDonnell was killed and his wife internally injured. Workmen were engaged repairing the track at the time.

Lawyer Wardell, of Dundas, has received a letter stating that Mr. Green had appointed the new postmaster of Dundas. Graham's opponent was one of the Collins boys, and the struggle for the position has been a keen one.

WELLINGTON. At Fergus on Saturday morning a Grand Trunk freight train struck a cow and carried her along some 75 feet, when the animal got under the engine, throwing it, together with the tender and five cars, from the rails. The fireman James Laing, was crushed between the tender and a car and instantly killed. He lived in Harrisburg and leaves a wife and two children. The engineer, Thomas Sloan saved his life by jumping.

A child of Henry Martin, Pilkington, wandered into a field of grain that was being cut and sat down, about four feet from the edge of the cut. The driver, when he was almost on him, saw his head, and stopped the horses as quickly as possible. As it was the sides of both shown were cut, and one of his feet slightly. Had he been a little nearer, both feet would have been mangled or cut off.

A fatal accident happened on Sept. 8, whereby a 16-year-old son of Joseph Hill, Maryboro', lost his life. He was driving a reaper, and in reaching forward to throw it out of gear one of the revolving rakes caught his head and threw him from the machine. Both arms and a leg were completely severed from his body. He was also severely cut about the face, and died in two hours after the accident.

At a meeting of the Guelph Fat Stock Club on Saturday, it was decided to hold the Christmas Fat Stock Show on Tuesday, Dec. 15, and the fair on Wednesday, Dec. 16. The secretary was instructed to ask the Agricultural and Arts Association to appropriate several prizes in classes that it thought most desirable.
