London, Nov. 2—The Mark Lane Express, in its weekly review of the British grain trade, says: English wheats are in improved request at la advance on lots of fair quality and weight. Foreign wheats are held. The uncertainty regarding Russian exports has disturbed the market slightly. Russia has already exported 9,730,000 quarters of wheat, against 8,004,000 quarters at the corresponding time last year, so even if the Russian Government prohibits the export of wheat the trade will not be greatly affected. There is a demand for American spring wheat. American flour is also in increased request. Foreign barley is actively bought and prices have risen 1s. Corn has advanced 1s for spot and 1s 6d for December. Oats are strong and the market is advancing. Heans average 1876 higher. Peas are 9d and linseed 6d higher.
