

Finding himself unrecognized, the young man spent a few days loitering about his old haunts, and picking up information of his father and sister, the latter a pretty girl, whom her brother had left as a mere child, One evening he went to his father's house during the latter's absence. His sister was greatly attracted by the strange guest, who had so many interesting experiences to relate, and they supped together. The brother, feigning fatigue, begged to be allowed to remain over night, as he had something of importance to say to the girl's father in the morning. The sister, though somewhat surprised at the request, consented, and prepared his sleeping apartment. On her father's late return the girl informed him of their unexpected guest, and dilated, unfortunately, on the stranger's wealth. The old man's cupidity was aroused, and during the night he stole into the guest's bedroom and murdered him in his sleep with an axe. During the next day the old neighbor, now returned, who had recognized the young man at the railway station, came with a number of friends to hear news of their emigrant relatives in the States. "Where is your son?" he inquired of the murderer. 'Whose son?" said the latter with blanched face. "Your own boy," said the neighbor, "who returned some days ago, and has made a fortune. A DESPERATE BATTLE.

Revolutionists Surprise the City-Three Days of Fighting-Fired on the Red Cross Corps. This change meant he would take her to the charity in the Government is the result of three days battle in Lima. The revolutionary forces led by Pierola entered the city at dawn Sunday morning. Immediately a desperate battle began, which lasted all through the day and part of the night. It was intensely dark, as the gas

supply was cut off and the streets, houses, and other buildings were without illumination. When the fighting ceased at night, drunken soldiers roamed through the streets firing recklessly. The battle was renewed at 5 o'clock Monday morning and continued all through the day. The night was one of terror. Depredations by the Government forces marked the opening of hostilities on Tuesday. The troops sacked the Union and National Clubs and many of the shops.

Thieves Get Away With 8,000 Gallons o Whisky in Bond. COLUMBIA, S. C., March 21.—In 1892 a man named Bieman, of Walhalla, S. C., sold distillery No. 374, three miles from that town, to W. C. Tatum. In the warehouse connected with the distillery were between 8,000 and 10,000 gallons of whisky. The warehouse was closed under the seal of a revenue officer, Mr. Tatum intending to hold the whisky for the three years allowed by law before stamping it. The warehouse was built on the slope of a hill. Robbers drew the staple off the door, inserted one end of a piece of hose into a whisky barrel, passed the hose through a crack in the wall, and siphoned the whisky into an empty barrel at the foot of the hill, several yards away. From that place they could haul it away without incurring any serious risk of detection. This process was repeated nightly until every gill of the whisky had been removed. Then the band assembled one night, and, after filling the barrels in

the warehouse with water, carefully replaced the staple and seal.
