WESTERN ONTARIO

Mr. Wm. Lloyd has sold the 45 acres on the 12th con., corner of Morphet road, Howard, to Walter Claus, of Harwich, receiving \$3,000.

Beans have taken quite a rise. New beans are worth 80c to 85c. The crop around Ridgeway won't be large, but what there are are fine.

William Albert Koyl and Ide Maud Cole, both of Southwold Station, were married on Wednesday by Rev. Principal Warner, of Alma College.

Mr. M. Roland, of Ridgeway, has accepted a position on the Wabash and is moving to St. Thomas. He will take up his residence on Scott street.

Nelle Dixon, an employee of Stearn's laboratory, Windsor, had her hand so badly crushed in one of the machines that it was necessary to amputate two fingers.

Father Renaud, assistant parish priest at Amherstburg, has been transferred to St. Anne's Church, Detroit, and Father Cote, of the latter parish, will go to Amherstburg.

A bylaw abolishing the ward system in Sarnia, and reducing the membership of the town council to one alderman to every 1,000 of population, carried, 622 voting for and 180 against it.

They want more rain at Ridgeway. Farmers are in many instances hauling for their stock, something they have not had to do in many years. The pastures in that section are almost destroyed.

The bylaw granting \$2,500 for building a switch from the Grand Trunk yards to the Dominion Wire Company's works, Sarnia, voted on by the ratepayers, carried by an almost unanimous vote.

Mr. J. W. Eddy, proprietor of the St. Mary's Journal, formerly business manager of the Times, has purchased an interest in the St. Thomas Times Printing Company, and has been appointed to the position of managing director.

Mr. J. Wilson, employed in the M. C. R. boiler shops, St. Thomas, on Tuesday received what may prove a serious injury. While striking a piece of steel flew off and embedded itself in his leg, badly bruising it and inflicting a cut three inches deep.

Sarnia is enjoying a great building boom, fully 100 houses being in process of erection to meet demands of new comers. Matters tending towards the inauguration of a first-class electric railway system in the near future are also progressing favorably.

The death of Mr. Charles Duncombe, at Watford, is much regretted. Mr. Duncombe operated the Watford roller flour mills for years. Deceased was a prominent Oddfellow. He leaves a wife, a brother, Mr. T. Duncombe, a sister, Mrs. Marlett, and his father.

Herman Hehne, who was arrested in Hespeler and sent up for trial on the charge of using the mails for illegal purposes, was arraigned before Judge Chisholm Tuesday forenoon at Berlin. He pleaded guilty to the charge and was sentenced to one year in the Central Prison.

At the division court at Chatham the Banner obtained judgment against the Chatham Athletic Association and the Sons of Scotland as garnishees for \$19.63, balance of an advertising contract. The original contract was for \$25 for the season, and when the baseball games dropped the advertisement was discontinued. Mr. Ford, through his solicitor, held that space was still at their disposal, and Judge Woods upheld this contention.

clerk of their London office. Mr. Jones is well known in mercantile circles, and is also a popular yacht man, being at the present time secretary of the Queen City Yacht Club.

—Mr. Will Porter, the son of Rev. W. H. Porter, formerly of this city, and second officer of the steamer Paris, when she was wrecked off Fallmouth, is now in charge of the ship at Milford Haven. He has been joined by Mrs. Porter, and they will remain in the old country for the remainder of the year, or until the Paris is afloat again. It is expected that the repairs to the Paris will cost not less than \$1,000,000.

—William G. Deary, through his attorney, is applying to Judge McHugh for an injunction to restrain the Windsor license board from issuing a license to Wm. Bauer, and to enjoin the latter and John Garvey, of this city, from interfering with his business. Deary was formerly lessee of the Detroit Exchange Hotel, but was put out of possession of the premises by Garvey, the owner, for alleged non-payment of rent. Mr. Garvey released the hotel to Bauer, and the license board has agreed to a transfer of the license from Deary to Bauer, but the new license has not yet been issued. Deary's claim is that the transfer cannot be made without his consent.

—Mrs. Gowanlock, sister of Messrs. J. L. and Milton Johnson, of this city, died at her home near Beamsville, on Tuesday night. Mrs. Gowanlock had a thrilling experience during the Northwest rebellion. It will be remembered that she was one of the ladies whose husbands were killed when the uprising occurred. She was held captive by the Indians until released after the battle of Batouche. The nervous shock was so intense that she never fully regained her health, but she bore with fortitude, courage and dignity her misfortune, and has lived in comfort and happiness with her father and mother until her death.

BRAKEMAN BARNES KILLED INSTANTLY

Fatality on the Canadian Pacific Railway at Chatham.

The Victim a Londoner—A Widow and Two Children Survive.

Fred Barnes, of this city, brakeman on the C. P. R., was killed at Chatham yesterday afternoon while shunting cars. A Chatham dispatch says: The accident happened on the diamond crossing of the L. E. and D. R. R. and C. P. R. Just how the fatality occurred no one knows. He was found by the train hands in a terribly mangled shape, and died in a few moments. Both feet were cut off, and his chest and head crushed in a frightful manner. Barnes leaves a wife and two children.

The accident occurred about 3 o'clock, and was witnessed by no one. It is thought the unfortunate man was either between cars coupling or about to climb up. His clothes are torn about the breast, and his head is badly bruised. Death was almost instantaneous. Deceased was a brakeman on the C. P. R. way freight going west.

Mr. Barnes' home was at 12 Alfred street. His wife and family visited the fair yesterday, and on returning home late in the afternoon a telegram announcing Mr. Barnes' death was received. The news was a terrible shock to the widow and children. The body was brought home on the C. P. R. special at 4 o'clock this morning.

DR. HUTCHINSON IS PRESIDENT

Of the Association of Health Officers of Ontario.

Convention Concluded—Interesting Papers Read and a Resolution Passed.

The Association of Health Officers of Ontario met again yesterday afternoon at the city hall at 2:30, with a much larger attendance than at any previous meeting.

Mr. A. Shantz, of Caledonia, opened the meeting with a paper on "Needs and Methods of School Ventilation." Mr. Shantz thought the ventilation of schools should be placed under efficient medical men. Mr. Shantz described a number of different methods of school ventilation.

The paper was discussed by Dr. Bryce and Inspector Dearness.

The following resolution was moved by Dr. Hall, and seconded by Dr. Connell: "That this association, having noticed with pleasure the strong views expressed in resolutions adopted at the recent meetings of the Canada Medical and the Ontario Medical Associations, recognizing: 1. The dangers at present arising on the treatment of consumption in its later and dangerous stages in our general hospitals. 2. The urgent demand which here is for a sanatoria for the treatment at an early stage of the disease of consumption, especially among the working classes in districts not too far removed from their homes. 3. The generally expressed belief of the medical profession of the curability of many cases of the disease if dealt with promptly when first diagnosed, does hereby desire to express its hearty indorsement of the views so expressed, and does hereby direct its executive council to co-operate in any work approved of by the medical profession of this country furthering the views so expressed." Carried.

The election of officers for the year was then proceeded with.

Dr. T. V. Hutchinson, medical health officer of this city, was elected president, and W. Van Buskirk, C. E., of Stratford, vice-president.

Dr. Hutchinson thanked the members for the honor conferred upon him. The retiring president was given a vote of thanks.

The following gentlemen were elected for the council for the coming year: E. E. Shuttlesworth, of Toronto; Dr. Hall, Chatham; Dr. Wardlaw, Galt; Dr. Sturgeon, Petrolia; Dr. Sheard, Toronto; Dr. Milloy, Preston; Dr. Connell, Kingston; and Dr. Bell, Main.

Dr. Mackenzie, of Toronto, was re-elected secretary-treasurer.

A vote of thanks to the city council and officials for the kind hospitality shown the visitors while in the city was passed. This brought the convention to a close.

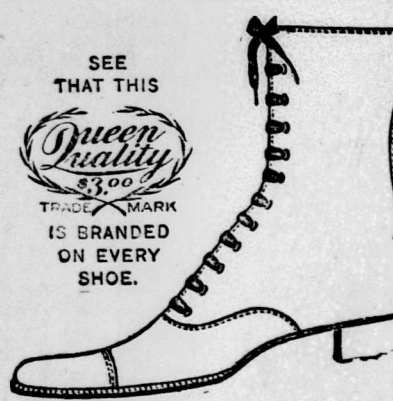
