CANADIAN GRAPES. London, Nov. 30.-Canadian shipments of grapes arrived in excellent condition and commanded good prices and a ready sale.

RUSSIA'S LATEST. London, Nov. 30 .- The Daily Chronicle this morning, publishing what it calls startling information, says:
Russia has decided to establish a permanent diplomatic agency in Cabul next spring. The ameer's consent has been obtained and pour-parlers have been exchanged between Count Muravieff and Great Britain, who is not likely to oppose the step.

CHABROL'S FORTIFICATIONS. Paris, Nov. 30. - In the high court (senate) yesterday the iron gratings and shutters of "Fort Chabrol," headquarters of the Anti-Semite League, where M. Guerin was besieged, were introduced as evidence. M. Guerin declared they could not be regarded as a serious fortification. A police inspector deposed that while on duty at Fort Chabrol M. Guerin threatened to shoot him with a carbine. The testimony evoked violent interruptions from the galleries, and the president of the court ordered them to be cleared. A prisoner, M. Barillier, thereupon shouted: "It is shameful!" and the public prosecutor asked that M. Barillier be punished. The court, after deliberation, sentenced him to a month's imprisonment.

DOWN THE MEDWAY. Sheerness, Nov. 30. - The imperial German yacht Hohenzollern, with the Emperor and Empress of Germany on board, which left here for Flushing at 7:50 a.m., was escorted by the Ger-man warship Hela and eight British torpedo boat destroyers, which went 20 miles out to sea with the German ships. Guards of honor on board all Sixth race, 34-mile, selling—Mocorito the various British warships presented Alleviate 2, Whitcomb 3. Time, arms as the Hohenzollern steamed down the Medway. As she passed the British battleship Sanspariel, a royal salute was fired, the band on board the battleship played the German national anthem and the band on the Hohenzollern replied with the British anthem. The particular service squadron took up the salutes, and the roar of the cannonade was incessant, the shore artillery here firing a parting salute as the Hohenzollern, with Emperor William on her bridge, rounded Garrison Point.

WELCOMED BY WILHELMINA. Flushing, Nov. 30.-The Emperor and Empress of Germany and their suite, on reaching Flushing, were welcomed in a most cordial manner by Queen Wilhelmina and the queen's mo-ther. Queen Wilhelmina, leaning on the arm of the emperor, and followed by the empress and queen mother, led the way to the brilliantly decorated royal pavilion where tea was taken. Then the emperor and empress, after affectionate farewells, entered the train in waiting and departed.
