Foremen are not to engage men without consultation with the city en-gineer, and they should divide work as

equally as possible between appli-Foremen must work with their men unless there is a gang of ten or over. Foremen must discharge any men doing unsatisfactory work, and must report the names of those so discharged to the city engineer, so that they may not be re-engaged.

In wet and muddy weather crossings opposite churches and public buildings and crossings on the principal streets must be kept clean. Foremen must make regular inspec-tions of all bridges and culverts, and report to the engineer as to their

At all times of the year ditches and gullies must be kept clear of ice, snow and rubbish, so that water may run
