The question of where the revolver was just before the shooting will also be of great importance, and what means Mrs. Scott had to take to get It. If it is proved that the revolver was immediately at hand the self-defense plea would naturally be stronger than if the weapon had to be sought for in some distant part of the house.

The position in which the body was found also leads to a good deal of interest, should this plea be presented. The deceased came around to the left of the house and so as he approached the doorway was facing it, and the wound inflicted could not have been made, it is alleged, unless he had gone past the door or had turned his back when he saw the revolver in Mrs. Scott's hand.
