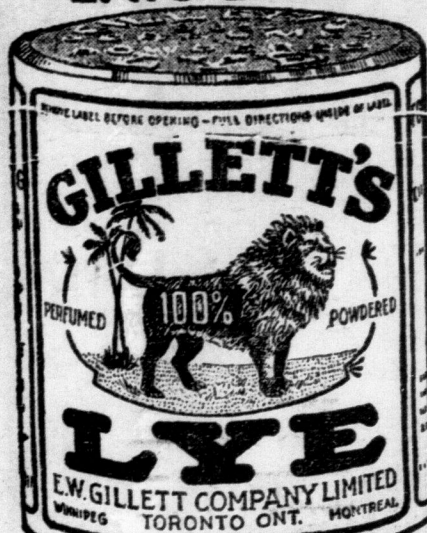

CLAIMS \$4,000,000

Romantic Case Is Being Heard in
French Courts.[Canadian Press.]
Paris, Dec. 2.—The hearing in one
of the most romantic cases before the
French courts began yesterday in the
civil tribunal of the Seine. It was the
claim of Mme. Comon against the
French Government for 20,000,000
francs (\$4,000,000), left by her ances-
sor, Jean Thery, who died in Corfu
in 1875, bequeathing a fortune to
his brothers and their descendants.The brothers entered endless litiga-
tions in the courts over the division
of the property, which the courts or-
dered held by the state bank of Venice
pending final judgment. There it lay
until 1875, when Napoleon seized it,
using part of it to pay his army and
forwarding the rest with all the docu-
ments to Paris. It is expected that
judgment will be rendered next week.Priest Stricken

term here.

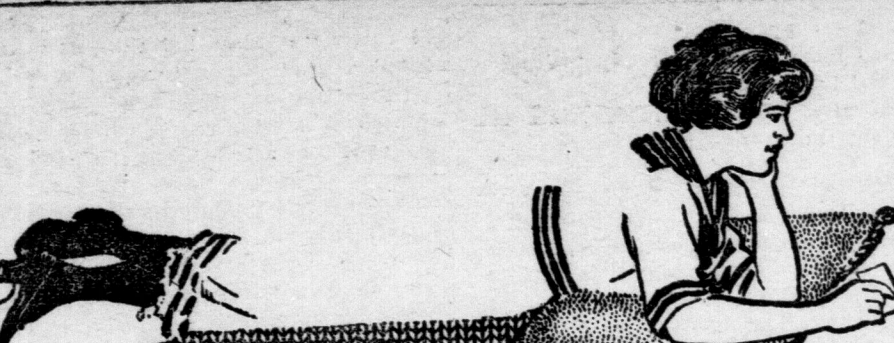
SURPRISED QUEEN
