> LEAGUE'S FINANCE **COMMITTEE'S PLAN** TO HELP AUSTRIA

Urges All Governments To Postpone Claims and All *Have Agreed Except U.S.

SCHEME IS OUTLINED

Bank of Issue Is Pivot to Enable Retirement of Hopelessly Debased Currency.

LONDON, June 9 .- The finance committee of the League of Nations, which has been sitting here for over a week to consider what could be done to rehabilitate Austria, adjourned with the assurance that, if other nations will help, the Austrians can be set on their again. One essential condition is that the governments entitled to repa-rations under the Treaty of St. Germain and to the repayment of loans granted for relief purposes, should postpone their claims for twenty years, and that any fresh loans contracted during the first five years of that term should have priority over these liens. Partial assurances that this will be done have been received afready from Great Britain, France, Japan and Czecho-Slovakia, and the committee is awaiting what attitude the United States will assume.

This and other parts of the proposals

In the report of the committee, it was explained, must, of necessity, be couched in general terms. Once they are in force, the committee recommends that temporary loans should be granted Austria to help her over the presen crisis, that a strong bank of issue b built up to retire all existing paper money, and issue a new series under proper central authority, and that a large permanent loan be floated.

From Private Sources.
It is not suggested that these loans either temporary or permanent, should be guaranteed by the governments. The committee has reason to believe that if only the essential conditions, namely, postponement of the treaty lien and the balancing of the budget, be complied with, it will be quite possible to raise the money required from private sources. It has gone with care into the resources that Austria can offer as collateral. There is the prospect of a 4 per cent mortgage on all real estate within the republic, and of liens on the customs, the tobacco mon-opoly, and, perhaps, the proceeds of the opoly, and, perhaps, the proceeds of the state forests, and it is convinced these afford ample security. But the pivot of the entire scheme is the bank of issue. On it will, of course, depend the retirement of the present hopelessly debased currency and the regulation of the new, and confidence in its strength and integrity is essential.
