

REDUCE BUDGET

British Chancellor Credited With Determination To Announce Lower Rates.

Must Meet Heavy Expenditure, But May Cut Income Tax.

LONDON, England, April 24 .-(Canadian Press Cable).-The prospects for the first budget of Sir Robert Horne, the chancellor of the exchequer, are being much discussed at present, he being confronted with practically a universal demand in the United Kingdom for a reduction in taxation, and though high expectations in this line are being discourfavor of the resolution than what aged in official quarters, Sir Robert is credited with a determination to announce reductions.

However, his secret is being closely kept, and probably he himself still is undecided as to details, as his attendance at the Genoa conference has interfered considerably with the preparation of the budget.

The chancellor has to meet an expenditure estimated at £900,000,000, and the revenue from taxation on the present basis is estimated at £940,-000,000. 
