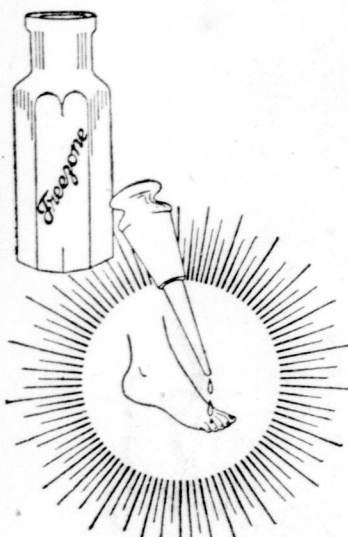

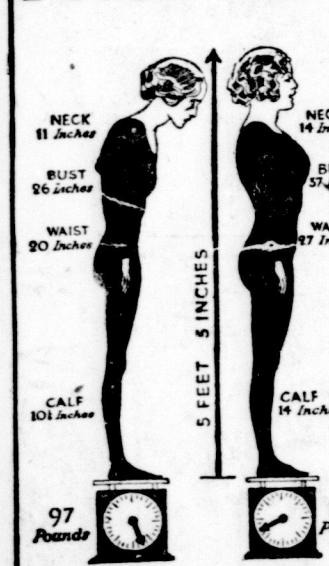

BITTER DEBATE MARKS MOTION BY M'MASTER

Premier King Informs Brome Member He Disapproves Resolution.

MEIGHEN HURLS CHARGE

Claims Prime Minister Displayed "Appalling" Inconsistency.

BULLETIN.
OTTAWA, April 24.—The McMaster resolution was defeated by 142 to 59 in the house when the vote was taken at 1 o'clock this morning. All Western Ontario members, with the exception of A. L. Hodgins and J. D. Drummond, Progressive members, J. L. Stansell and Franklin White of Elgin and London respectively, were not in the house to vote.

OTTAWA, April 24.—(By Canadian Press).—Eagerly awaited, the resolution of A. B. McMaster, Liberal member for Brome, on directorates and cabinet portfolios, came before the house tonight; and debate, thereon was marked by a bitterness such as never before has been seen in the present Parliament. House and galleries filled rapidly once Mr. McMaster rose to his feet. Every move was followed with excited interest.

In brief, the resolution expressed the opinion that ministers of the crown, on their appointments as such, should resign all directorships held by them in banks, trust companies, insurance companies, transportation companies or public utility companies.

The house presented such a scene as when Mr. McMaster submitted his more sweeping bill of last session, a bill which went down on second reading by 105 to 54.

But the setting had changed. Then Mr. McMaster spoke from the shades of opposition, and the government which opposed his measure was a Conservative administration. Today he spoke from government benches, and it was a Liberal prime minister who announced that so far as the resolution reflected on those associated with him in his cabinet he must absolutely decline to vote for it.

King Opposes Resolution.
The prime minister made a special reference to Sir Lomer Gouin, minister of justice, mentioned during the debate, as director of a number of financial and commercial concerns. He told of the invitation extended to Sir Lomer Gouin to join the cabinet, and of Sir Lomer's hesitancy again to enter the vicissitudes of public life if it meant severance of his financial and commercial associations.

"I told him," added the prime minister, "that I would not think of pressing my own individual opinions in matters of this kind as against the judgment of himself or any of my colleagues in the present administration." As between the prime minister and his colleagues the attitude was "trust me all in all, or not at all."

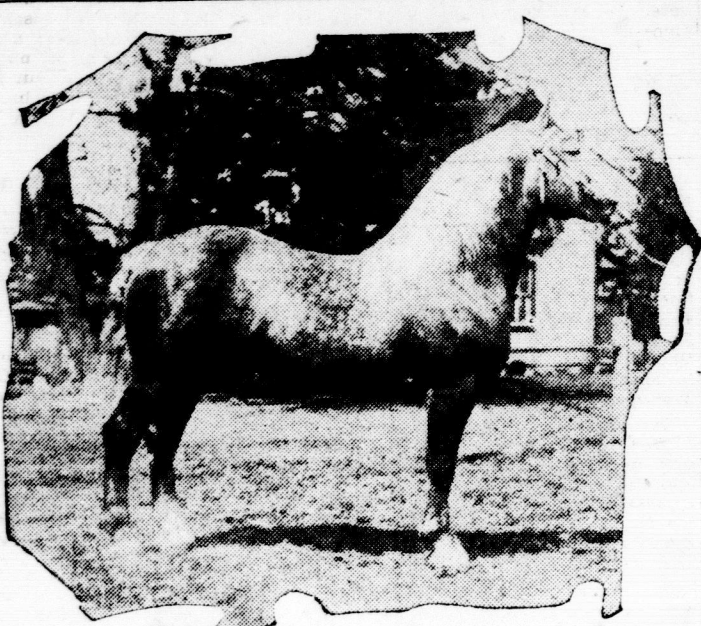
Sir Lomer himself was not in the house during the afternoon. The prime minister's speech was followed by one from Hon. Mr. Meighen, leader of the opposition. Mr. Meighen charged the prime minister with "appalling" inconsistency.

Last year the prime minister had stood in support of the McMaster bill as to want to extend it to the leader of the opposition. Six of the men now on treasury benches voted for the bill of last year; today, they were sitting side by side with directors of corporations who would have been denied cabinet posts had the bill passed.

Former Bill More Drastic.
"The prime minister," exclaimed Mr. Meighen, "had to decide to take capacity or principle. Without a moment's hesitation he abandoned principle."

In moving his resolution Mr. McMaster said it did not propose that

members of the government who were directors in private companies should resign their directorships; but such a company would not have the privilege of doing business with the government. The resolution did ask that members of the government, who were directors in large banks, transportation companies, et cetera, should resign their directorships in the public interest.

It was not desired to discuss the resolution on a personal basis, but rather as a matter of principle. The bill introduced by Mr. McMaster last session was more drastic than the present resolution, and provided that fifteen days after his appointment a cabinet minister must resign from any directorships. The modification had been made because of the arguments which were advanced against the bill last year, and which showed that it was unwise to go as far as was proposed then. Mr. McMaster was, however, returning to the charge with respect to cabinet ministers holding directorships such as stated in the resolution. The time of a cabinet minister was fully occupied with the affairs of his department. It was impossible to serve two masters.

There was no stronger argument in favor of the resolution than what had happened in connection with the Merchants Bank of Canada.

Cites Ballantyne.
The former minister of marine and fisheries (Mr. Ballantyne) was a director of the Merchants Bank of Canada. The assets of the Merchants Bank were sold to the Bank of Montreal. He had no criticism to offer on this transaction. It was probably for the best, but, Mr. Ballantyne was also a director of the Royal Trust Company, which was generally believed to be "a side door to the Bank of Montreal." It was difficult to know whether Mr. Ballantyne had represented the interests of the Bank of Montreal, the Merchants Bank, or the Canadian people in the transaction. He had no charges to make in the matter, but he thought ministers should not be put in such a questionable position.

For a cabinet minister to hold a position in which he was a trustee of the people's money and yet unable to perform the duties required by this trust was unfair to himself and unfair to the people.

The world was struggling for economic equality, and people saw, with some dismay, that the money power was rapidly getting into fewer and fewer hands.

Mr. McMaster declared that his bill was in line with the prohibitory clauses in the Senate and House of Commons act and also in the act concerning judgeships.

Reads From Act.
He read from the act governing the railway commission to show that the members of that body were forbidden to hold directorships in railway companies or in companies manufacturing railway equipment. The cabinet was a court of appeal from the judgments of the railway commission. Surely the court of appeal must also be under the same limitation.

Mr. McMaster understood that Sir Robert Borden and Sir Thomas White had resigned all their directorships on becoming members of the government in Canada. The best practice in Great Britain, France and the United States was for cabinet ministers to resign their directorships in private companies.

It was also in line with the views and practice of the banks themselves. An examination of the list of directors of the leading banks would show that no man who was a director of one was a director of another.

O. R. Gould (Progressive, Assiniboia) approved the bill introduced by Mr. McMaster last session, and as a consistent man would support the resolution this year.

Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King, prime minister, said that if the intention and the object of the move was to promote in the mind of the country a greater sense of security, it was a worthy object. In so far as the resolution was calculated to create suspicion of the government in the minds of the people, he was opposed to it. Mr. McMaster had cited his resolution, and Mr. King agreed that it would be a good thing to go to the British constitutional authorities for a precedent. In the British house the question had not generally been so confined. It was generally a question of the right of members to vote on matters in which they personally were interested. Among the best minds the conclusion appeared to be that it was a matter which could best be left to the conscience and honor of the member.

HORNE HOPES TO REDUCE BUDGET

British Chancellor Credited With Determination To Announce Lower Rates.

Must Meet Heavy Expenditure, But May Cut Income Tax.

LONDON, England, April 24.—(Canadian Press Cable).—The prospects for the first budget of Sir Robert Horne, the chancellor of the exchequer, are being much discussed at present, he being confronted with practically a universal demand in the United Kingdom for a reduction in taxation, and though high expectations in this line are being discouraged in official quarters, Sir Robert is credited with a determination to announce reductions.

However, his secret is being closely kept, and probably he himself still is undecided as to details, as his attendance at the Genoa conference has interfered considerably with the preparation of the budget.

The chancellor has to meet an expenditure estimated at £900,000,000, and the revenue from taxation on the present basis is estimated at £940,000,000. A shilling off each pound of income tax would mean a reduction of £50,000,000, while a penny off the beer, sugar and tea duties, which is regarded as among the possibilities would altogether result in a reduction of £40,000,000.

Rides on Tongue of Wagon When Horses Become Frightened and Bolt.

WINGHAM, April 24.—What might have been a fatal accident terminated in a miraculous escape for Peter McDougall of Turnberry Friday last. He, with a number of other farmers, was drawing baled hay to Wingham. When coming down a hill his load started to slide off. The horses, becoming frightened, bolted, and Mr. McDougall on top of a bale of hay was thrown onto the tongue of the wagon. The horses ran about ten rods with McDougall in this position and were finally stopped by the wagon striking a pile of logs on the side of the road, one of the horses being thrown into a wire fence. McDougall escaped with a few bruises and a shaking-up, while one of the horses was scratched a little.

**CONFIRM NEWS OF
LAMBTON WRECK**

PORT ARTHUR, April 24.—Apparent confirmation of the report that the Canadian government light-house supply steamer Lambton had been wrecked near Michipicoten has been received by the Port Arthur wireless station which today was in touch with steamers containing wireless apparatus, and sent word that the lights at Caribou had not been lighted. The Lambton, it is understood, had the light-keeper of Caribou aboard and was proceeding to the island. The wireless station also reports the steamers held in the ice are now free and en route to points of destination.
