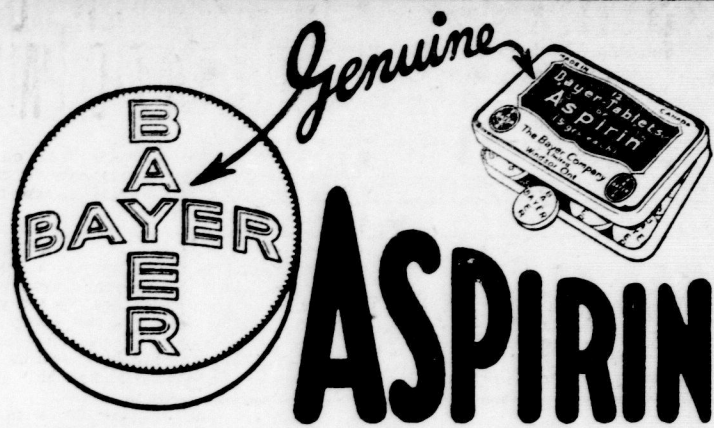

PROPOSES BILL TO BOOST TAX ON RACE TRACKS

Hon. Peter Smith Wants Revenue From Half-Mile Courses Increased.

PAY ONLY \$2,500 PER DAY

Treasurer Urges Percentage on Pari-Mutuel Commissions in Legislature.

TORONTO, Feb. 23.—In the Legislature this afternoon, Attorney-General W. E. Raney introduced a bill to enable county court judges to sit in criminal courts while the court of sessions was also in progress. This was designed to facilitate matters in the Toronto courts.

Before the orders of the day were called, Captain Joseph E. Thompson queried the government as to its attitude with respect to the power development being undertaken at Carleton Falls on the Ottawa River by the Robert interests of Quebec. Mr. Thompson said that this scheme would probably prejudice future Ontario projects higher up the river.

Premier E. C. Drury replied that the matter had not yet been brought to his attention. If it was it would receive consideration, he stated.

E. Wellington Hay, the Liberal leader, asked if it was the intention to deal with pressing hydro business, the interim vote, at an early date, say next Tuesday. If the debate on the address was out of the way.

Premier Drury replied that when the debate was disposed of it was the intention to bring on the hydro business immediately.

Mr. Raney also introduced a bill providing for the appointment of a probation officer and any assistants who might be required for any county, including any city or town in that country. The duties of such an officer would consist of supervising employment and conduct of any person during a period of probation imposed by the court.

In Lengthy Caucus. The government supporters in the house put in two hours in caucus to-night, considering legislation being sponsored by the Drury ministers at the present session. The caucus was largely a routine one, the one big issue of the session—hydro—being left over for a later gathering, the government's proposals being not quite ready for submission to the members.

The measures placed before the caucus came from Raney, Hon. Peter Smith, Hon. Mr. Biggs and Hon. Mr. Miller.

The outstanding proposal, being fathered this session by Hon. Peter Smith, is one looking to the collection of further revenues from the race tracks, particularly the half-mile tracks, which have been getting off comparatively light. At the present time they are paying only \$2,500 per diem, while the mile tracks pay \$5,000, though there is little difference in the revenue from pari-mutuel commissions. In order to equalize things, the treasurer is proposing to take a percentage on all pari-mutuel commissions, maintaining at the same time the daily tax on the meets. The minister also, it is said, explained other proposals to increase revenues, including a lift upward in the theatre box.

It was learned after the caucus that there was little likelihood of the proposed new travel or gasoline tax being covered by legislation this session. One strong argument against such a tax now is that it is imposing on motorists everywhere a "travel" tax burden in advance of the completion of the highway system.

HEADS MARITIME UNITED FARMERS

FREDERICTON, N. B., Feb. 23.—Thomas W. Caldwell, M. P. for Carleton-Victoria, was re-elected president of the United Farmers of New Brunswick at this morning's session of the convention of the Agrarians' provincial political organization.

The convention endorsed resolutions which were passed by the United Farmers of Ontario, the first deploring the attempts to divide the people of Canada along racial and religious lines for political purposes, and pledging every effort to unite all classes in Canadian citizenship, and the second congratulating T. A. Cresson on his political success, and pledging him support in avoiding all entangling alliances with either of the old parties.

SIR ADAM BECK IS SERIOUSLY ILL

Special to London Advertiser. ASHVILLE, North Carolina, Feb. 23.—Sir Adam Beck, chairman of the Ontario Hydro-Electric Power Commission, is seriously ill at the home of friends in the Grove Park Inn here.

Local physicians and nurses are in attendance upon Sir Adam, who is suffering from bronchitis, and is threatened with pneumonia.

Miss Marion Beck, daughter of the hydro chairman, is in constant attendance at her father's side.

FIND NEW CLUE IN DELORME CASE
MONTREAL, Feb. 23.—Evidence proving that Raoul Delorme, the young Ottawa student, was shot to death in a bed while he was asleep is believed to have been found by the police, according to a local paper.

The discovery of the new evidence clears up the mystery of where the young man was killed, it is said.

Palmerston Marriage Dispute Moved To Toronto on Writ of Habeas Corpus

PALMERSTON, Feb. 23.—Late this afternoon the Arnold-Moore marriage dispute moved to Toronto in response to Alex. Arnold's writ of habeas corpus. The case will be ventilated tomorrow at Osgoode Hall.

The parties of both sides traveled by different routes, although they could all take the same train to the city. Mr. and Mrs. William Moore and their 17-year-old daughter and bride, Mrs. Azella Edna Moore Arnold of Teviotdale, their only child, accompanied by W. N. Munro, barrister, left here by Grand Trunk, while Alex. Arnold, with A. S. Clarke, barrister, of Mount Forest departed from that town by Canadian Pacific.

From shortly after 9 o'clock yesterday morning, until near 6 o'clock at night, Mr. and Mrs. Moore and their daughter held a consultation with Mr. Munro, following which it was said Mrs. Arnold was firm in her stand that she would not return to her husband. She expects to become a mother in a few months.

"I'll never get back to live with him," she declared, and she spoke with some bitterness. "When I left his home, there was hardly any food. I had no money, and I wish you could have seen the furnishings."

Mrs. Arnold also said she had never been under restraint, and had acted, in leaving Arnold's home with her mother, upon her own initiative.

A reporter today was permitted to see the birth certificate of Mrs. Arnold, which shows she was born in Wellington County on July 7, 1904, which makes her 17 years old.

Mrs. Arnold is tall, standing over six feet in height, rather thin, blue eyes, fair hair, and presents a girlish appearance. She is broken-hearted over the affair, as is her mother.

3 ST. THOMAS JUVENILES STEAL AUTOMOBILE ROBE
Commit Further Crime Despite the Efforts of the Kiwanians.

ST. THOMAS, Feb. 23.—Despite the strenuous efforts of their Kiwanian foster fathers to keep them straight, three juvenile members of the now defunct juvenile crime organization, which a few months ago committed many petty robberies in this city, were arraigned before Magistrate Maxwell in the local police court Thursday charged with stealing an automobile robe from a car owned by J. Irwin of Norwich.

The boys told the magistrate they had planned to run away as they were tired of their home surroundings.

What to do with the prisoners perplexed the court, so he remanded them until Saturday in order that he could give the matter careful consideration.

CLAIM FOUR MORE WALL STREET FIRMS COLLAPSE

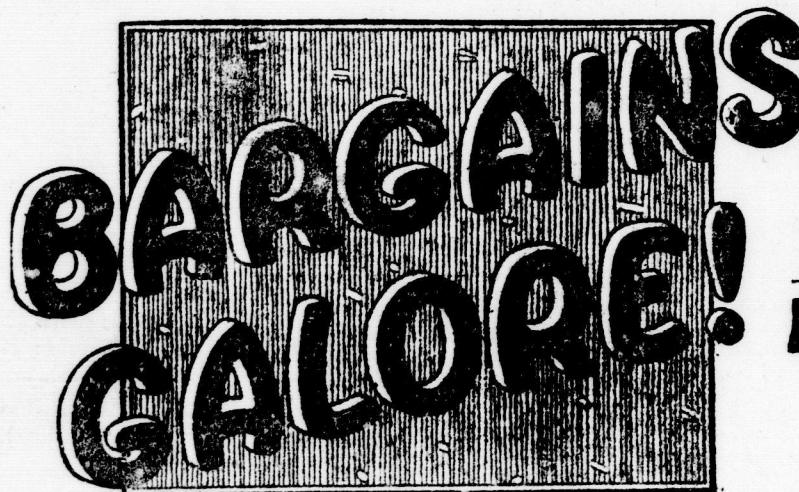
Involuntary petitions in bankruptcy were filed in federal courts against:

J. W. Ball & Company, liabilities estimated at \$150,000, and assets at \$10,000.

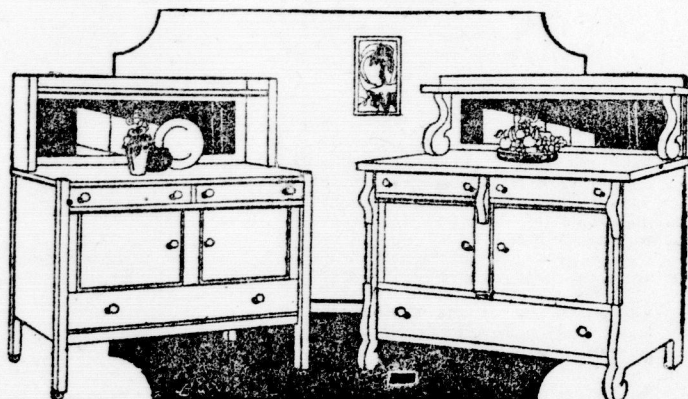
Rodney & Company, liabilities and assets not given.

The New York Curb market also announced the suspension of Rasmussen & Company for alleged failure to meet its engagements.



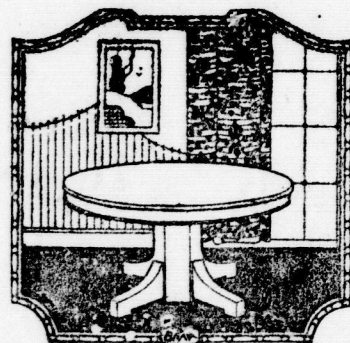

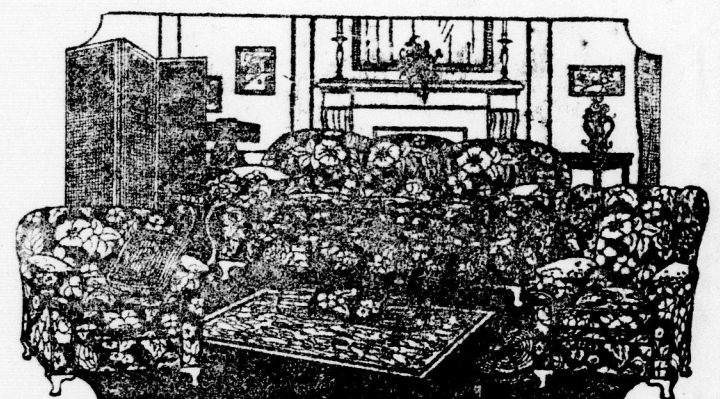

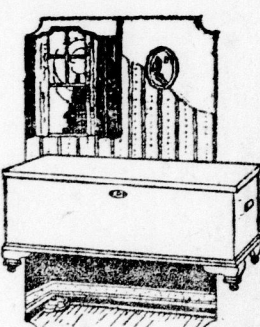
