PLAN NEW REAL ESTATE BYLAW

Members of No. 2 Committee Propose Regulating Opening of Surveys.

Mayor Alleges Lots Sold Without Conveniences of Any Kind.

Regulations which will prevent the opening of real estate surveys in this city, unless the property to be offered for sale is provided with water, sewer, sidewalk and sewer facilities, along with graded roads, will in all probability be recommended by No. 2 committee of the city council which meets Tuesday night.

Mayor Cameron Wilson, who sponsors a bylaw to this effect, has pointed out that plans of surveys in London have been accepted when the lots sold had no water or sewer connections, and after the survey has been all sold the newcomers clamor for sidewalks and similar local improvements, while sections of vacant land more centrally located in the city are allowed to go unpopulated.

If the bylaw is put through by the city no surveys will be allowed to be registered unless provided with the facilities laid down by the city council. The members of No. 2 committee will discuss it Tuesday night.

Another question to be discussed is the bylaw regulating erection of gasoline service tanks in the city, and the proposed collection of a rental of \$25 per year for every such station erected on city boulevards. This bylaw will likely be referred to the council by committee.

The communication of the London Life Insurance Company regarding its proposed new office buildings, to be erected on Dufferin avenue, opposite Victoria Park, will come in for consideration at the meeting, and the committee will confer with the company as to the type of office buildings planned for this residential district.

Among the deputations which will wait on No. 2 committee Tuesday night will include Front street ratepayers, desirous of hearing the report of City Engineer H. A. Brazier on the cost of a breakwater to protect their property. It is expected that this report will be presented at the session, and upon it the future action of Front street residents who demand protection from flooding.

MANY LONDONERS GOING TO EUROPE THIS SUMMER

H. J. McCallum, C. P. R. Ticket Agent, States That Majority Will Return in September.

Quite a few Londoners will spend the summer months in Europe this year, according to H. J. McCallum, ticket agent of the Canadian Pacific Railway in this city. Mr. McCallum stated that the majority going abroad leave Canada during June and July and return in September at the earliest. It is the custom, he said, to visit the British Isles first and from there go to the Continent.

Not many of London's foreign population, however, are going abroad this year, the prevailing business condition and the chaotic state of some of the smaller countries of Europe being given as the reason.

"The foreign element of the country is moving very little," Mr. McCallum declared.

Lake passenger traffic is good this year, and the C. P. R. steamers, he stated, and some weeks the bookings are filled far in advance. Two of the great lake steamers, the Assiniboia and the Keewatin, ply between Port McNicholl and Port Arthur, while the Manitoba runs from Owen Sound to Port Arthur.

Confronted with the case of a demented woman, residing on York street, who refuses to remove her clothes on retiring and who has not taken off her shoes for more than two months, Sanitary Inspector Richard Sanders is in a quandary. The inspector desires to have the woman admitted to the Ontario Hospital, but having regard for her family does not wish to employ any violence or call in the assistance of the police.

On visiting the home of this unfortunate citizen Tuesday, the inspector discovered her lying on the lawn, talking to her son. The latter, whom the inspector describes as a bright young boy, was about to go for a swim.

To Mr. Sanders' astonishment, his mother admonished the lad not to take his cap off while in swimming because "you might get your head wet."

EXPECT 12,000 TO CELEBRATE

Orangemen Will Commemorate Battle of Boyne in St. Thomas.

What is expected to be one of the largest Orange celebrations in this district will be held in St. Thomas Wednesday, July 12, where preparations are being made to accommodate between 12,000 and 15,000 people from all parts of Western Ontario. Everything is in readiness, it was stated Tuesday morning, and the weather is the only thing that can hinder the extensive program to be carried out at Pinfaro Park.

Joe Carson, county master, declared that if the day is fine the delegation from this city to the grand Orange celebration in the Railroad City would reach 2,000, and that at least five bands from London would take part in the parade.

All the members of the ten city Orange lodges, and the True Blue Lodge, will assemble at the Orange Hall, Market Lane, at 9:30 Wednesday morning, and will wear full regalia. The delegation will make the trip on a L. and P. S. special train to leave at 10:20.

An elaborate program of sports and novelty events has been arranged for the afternoon at St. Thomas. Features of the day will be a baseball game, a lacrosse match, a football game and a band competition. In the evening dancing will hold sway.

Premier Drury was invited to attend the monster celebration, and he replied that if it was at all possible he would attend the annual demonstration. Other prominent speakers are H. C. Hocken, M.P., of Toronto, and E. T. Essery, K.C., of London.

The Orange lodges from this city will be in charge of A. Niven, master of ceremonies; Joe Carson, county master, and C. O. Smith, secretary.

In St. Thomas the lodges of that city will be in charge of the parade, with each county marshal supervising his own lodges.

Mr. Carson stated this morning that although the parade would not probably be as large as was held in London last year.

Sunday night the Orangemen of the district around Grampian held a church parade to the Methodist church in that village. Rev. W. Hunter preached in his sermon outlining briefly the history of Orangeism, and pointed out the important part holidays play in the lives of all cases of people.

RAILMEN NOT TO ACCEPT WAGE CUT

London Brotherhood of Railway Employees Claims Reduction Is Unfair.

Contending that the proposed wage cut, ranging from two to five cents an hour, in view of the present living conditions, is decidedly unfair, more than 150 members of the Brotherhood of Railway Employees of this city, in regular session Monday night, decided that they would not accept any reduction in wages proposed by the railways.

Considerable dissatisfaction was manifested by the employees when a communication was read from W. D. Cobb, vice-president of the Grand Trunk Railway Company, informing the union that the cuts would be enforced in the various departments on July 16.

As local officials received this communication on June 23, and according to the schedule that the men are working under the new clauses states that before any agreement can be changed or broken to any extent 30 days' notice must be given. The employees hold that Mr. Cobb's notice in giving them only 17 days' notice is by no means fair, and so will not abide by it.

The Brotherhood of Railway Employees held other meetings of a similar nature throughout the entire railway system Monday night and local officials are of the opinion that the feeling of the workers is the same over all the country.

Within a short time the result of the vote in each division will be sent to General Chairman James McGuire in Ottawa, who will act upon the information received, and open negotiations with railway executive officials in Montreal.

The proposed reduction by Mr. Cobb would mean a decrease of two cents an hour for stationary firemen and others, three cents for clerks, and for freight handlers and truckers, and for a certain class of round-house laborers which are included in the B. of R. E., the reduction would mean five cents an hour.

A year ago the Brotherhood of Railway Employees received a similar cut, and as the cost of living has not decreased to an extent warranting another reduction, the men decided to oppose any further reduction in wages.

Others Also Remember Being Present at Civic Body Luncheon 62 Days Ago.

"It was 62 days ago today," remarked a member of No. 2 committee of the board of education Tuesday morning.

"Oh, you mean the last session of the civic commission," rejoined Trustee Edwin Smith, chairman.

"Yes, I remember now; we all gathered at Smallman's for luncheon."

"And we all paid our own checks," the chairman added, as an afterthought, "did we not?"

"Yes, we did," responded other members of the commission who were present when the commission in question, headed by Mayor Cameron Wilson, received under advisement such items as the collegiate, technical and public school debenture requests.

Nothing of these has since been heard of, and Tuesday morning Trustee Bryden Campbell essayed the remark: "I think I am a member of that commission, come to think of it."

The board, assured the committee that no opposition would be forthcoming from the city council or Mayor Wilson respecting a debenture issue for this purpose.

Hunt Accommodations. In the meanwhile Trustee A. A. Rice and Senior School Inspector V. K. Greer will continue their efforts to secure adequate accommodation to care for the increased attendance in the district affected.

Inspector Greer reports that the annex to the Ealing public school will be placed in use again, to house 35 or 40 pupils in September next. Negotiations are in progress between the school authorities and the managers of the Hamilton Road Presbyterian Church, relative to the rental of the basement of that edifice, which will house 60 children.

The latter meet in session Tuesday night. Inspector Greer reported, when the question will be discussed, although Dr. Copeland, representing the church officials, has assured that nothing will stand in the way of an amicable understanding. The trustees emphasize the point, however, that this accommodation will be for a year only, by which time a new school must be provided.

Warns Committee. Discussing the request for new floors in the Empress avenue public school, West London, Inspector Greer warned the committee that a new school for that section of the community would be imperative within the next five years.

"The situation regarding classroom accommodation is becoming more and more difficult," the inspector declared. "The Tecumseh avenue and Boyle Memorial schools will be unable to care for further additional pupils after 1923, while this year we are opening the last spare room in the Ryerson school, while the other rooms are already crowded in certain instances beyond capacity."

It was decided to recommend to the board that the floor of the Empress avenue school be repaired. "It is very insanitary," Inspector Greer explained. "You can see through the cracks, and there is no cellar beneath certain rooms."

GOVERNMENT EMPLOYEE DISAPPEARS FROM FALLS

Niagara Falls, July 11.—"Good-bye, all you people," were the farewell words spoken to his wife and family by William H. Race, war veteran and superintendent of the government employment bureau here when he left his home at 8 o'clock on Monday morning, July 3, and has not been heard from since.

Although the provincial police have scoured the country and aid has been given in the search by leading citizens, not a clue can be found of the government employee who so mysteriously disappeared.

Goldberg Says He Gave Two Men Auto Lift, But No Bottle Of Whiskey

Evidence of special O. T. A. enforcement officers from Toronto to the effect that they had given Charles Cox money for a bottle of whiskey on July 4, and that Nathan Goldberg had delivered it, resulted in Cox being fined \$500 and costs, and Goldberg being assessed \$200 and costs in police court Tuesday morning.

Cox was convicted Monday afternoon, but the penalty was not imposed in his case until Goldberg had been tried Tuesday morning. Originally both Cox and Goldberg were charged with keeping liquor for sale contrary to section 40 of the O. T. A., but after Cox had been convicted the prosecution changed the charge against Goldberg to having liquor in a place other than a private dwelling contrary to section 41 of the act, as it has been a matter of principle in the London court the two persons are not convicted of the same charge when only one bottle is involved.

WILL ASK ACTION ABOUT COLLEGIATE

Trustees To Appeal To City Council On School Affairs.

Content to await no longer the pleasure of Mayor Cameron Wilson's civic commission, Trustee A. E. Silverwood, chairman of No. 3 committee of the board of education, will ask, at a special meeting of that body Friday afternoon next, that the members of the city council render immediate and definite action relative to the Central Collegiate Institute situation.

"We'll likely meet again Friday," the chairman explained Tuesday morning, "when we will move to clear up these matters pertaining to the Collegiate Institute. We'll appeal to the city council for some action. We don't have to appeal to the civic commission. We should certainly have had some action before this."

Trustee Silverwood points out that in May last the members of the board approved of the request from his committee of a further debenture issue of \$17,000 to liquidate the debt incurred by the construction and equipment of the school in question.

"We have heard nothing since this request went to the civic commission," the chairman points out. "We'll have to have an accounting in a few days. However, I understand that the Kingston Construction is back at work completing their tasks, and the school will soon be ready for formal acceptance by the board. We'll need the money then."

While it was reported several weeks ago that the various sub-contractors employed by the Kingston company had not been paid, the chairman states that while he is not acquainted with the facts of the case, it is purely a matter between themselves.
