The nursery is only capable of taking care of 24 children, and the board is predicting an overflow of children in the near future. The increase in attendance is due to the reopening of school, as during the summer months the children, who are old enough to go to school during the winter, are the care of the younger ones, but when vacation ends, the mothers resort to the nursery to take care of the baby children.

An appeal was made for canned fruit, especially to the mothers' clubs. Miss Bodkin reported that there were many empty jars at the nursery which could be used again. The Toronto Street Mothers' Club has already taken three dozen, which will be returned filled with fruit. A number of improvements have been made during the summer months, and the board is planning a summer sale to be held shortly to augment the funds.
