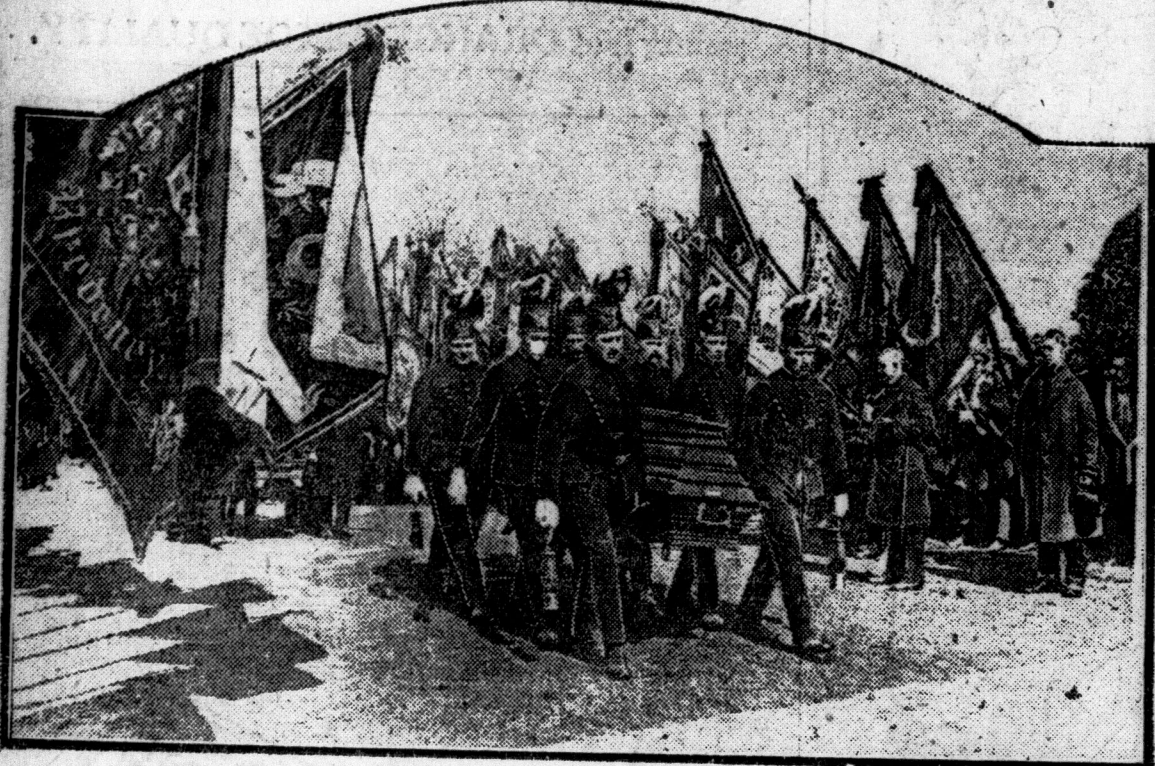

The French are giving great attention to the care of the German children in the Ruhr. The photo shows a soldier with a little girl whom he has given a can of food.



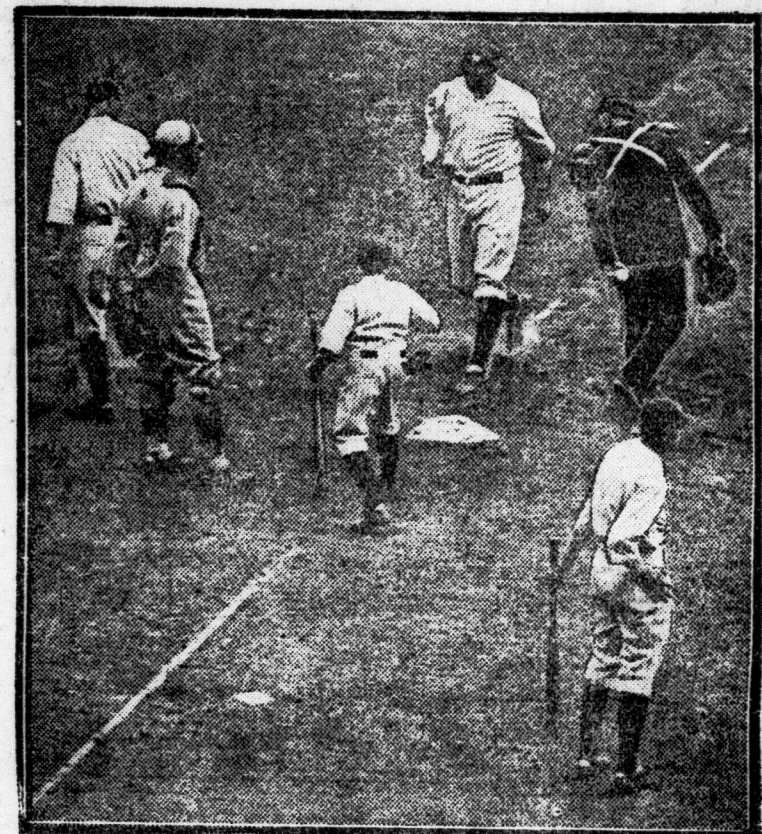
Miss Mariette Van Hoorde, a Belgian girl now living in Toronto, who is suing W. W. McKeown for alleged breach of promise.

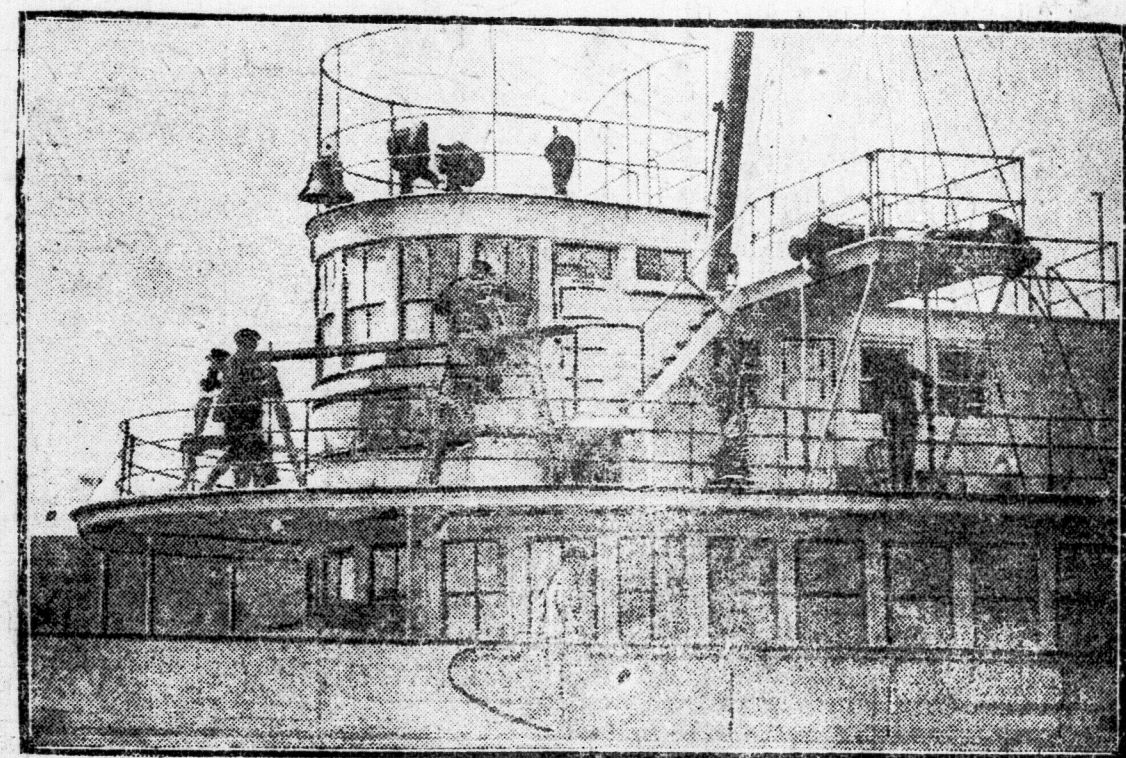
Charlie Paddock, star sprinter, left for France determined to compete in the meet there even without official sanction.
