These formed the First Brigade, while the Royal Marine Light Infantry and the company of the Royal Marine Artillery from the ship formed No. 1 battalion of the Sec-

fortreeg battery of field pieces.

The firing of the feu de joie was practised, and the whole force was afterwards marched past in the regulation manner both in column and quarter column, and also in line of quarter column
