ARE NOW PREPARING THE TREATY OF PEACE

British Statesmen Were Unprepared for Speedy Breaking of Seeming Deadlock But Are Gratified at Outcome of the Appeal—The Official Statement.

PORTSMOUTH, Aug. 29.—The following statement was issued tonight by Mr. Sato on behalf of the Japanese plenipotentiaries: "The question of the final disposition of the island of Sakhalin and the reimbursement to Japan of her war expenses have from the first been issues upon which absolute divergence of opinion has existed."

HE IS 'IT'

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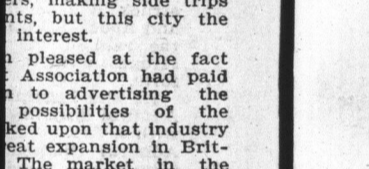
