ROBBED CARS

Convicted of Breaking Into Freight Cars and Taking Liquor and Other Goods

For some time complaints have been made that the seals of freight cars were found tampered with, and small quantities of goods were missing from cars. These breaks occurred between Mont Joli and Campbellton.

C. G. R. Detective Culligan was instructed to watch the matter and after a few days he placed under arrest two railway men. One upon being confronted with the evidence pleaded guilty, while the other decided to stand trial.

The goods which consisted of liquor, cigarettes, tobacco and other articles, were taken to Rimouski where they were disposed of.

Both men bore good characters and judgment has been reserved.

Dear Sir:

People hear on the street or see in the papers that a large number of cases of typhoid fever have developed in town and that there is a menace of a severe epidemic. For the benefit of the public allow me to rectify these reports and state the exact sanitary conditions of the town on this subject.

About one month ago several cases of typhoid fever were reported at the same time in a certain district of the town. After investigation, it was deemed necessary to send samples of milk delivered by a certain milk vendor, as all these cases, except one or two, were taking their milk from the same party. The report of the milk examination shows that no "typhoid bacilli" were found in the milk, but that it was contaminated by "colon

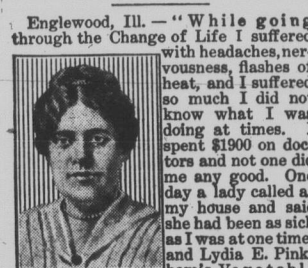

"The colon bacilli will cause a disease which has all the symptoms of typhoid fever and which lasts almost as long, but with less severity in the majority of cases."

The examination of the blood of the patient is the only means to tell whether it is real typhoid fever of a colon bacilli infection that we have to treat. This has little importance, as the treatment is the same.

This colon bacilli infection was only temporary in that district and no new cases developed lately.

Apart from that, there are a few cases of typhoid fever in town, but perhaps less than we generally have every fall, and several of them took their infection out side of Campbellton. Some will judge of the town's sanitary conditions regarding typhoid fever by the number of cases treated in our hospital. This is a mistake, as mostly all these patients are from out side districts.

Our water seems to be pure and we have no reason to believe that one single case of typhoid was caused by it.

IMPORTANT JUDGMENT IN LUMBER CASE

R. N. LeBlanc Wins in Suit Brought Against Him for Stumpage

Judgment was rendered in the Superior Court at New Carlisle, last week in a case which has been before the Courts for a number of years, and which attracted considerable attention throughout the Province of Quebec.

About six years ago, the late Honorable Jean Prévost, Member for Terrebonne in the Legislature of the Province of Quebec, made certain charges against the Honorable John Hall Kelly, of N. W. Carleton, to the effect that the latter had been connected with Mr. R. N. LeBlanc, of Bonaventure, and had assisted the latter in avoiding the payment of Crown dues for lumber cut on Crown Lands.

As a result of these charges, the Government of the Province decided at the time, to take an action at law against Mr. LeBlanc, as the Honorable Mr. Prévost claimed that he was indebted to the Government in over \$20,000.00 for stumpage dues, which had remained unpaid.

The case commenced several years ago, and over a hundred witnesses were heard. All parties who held location tickets in the Townships of Cox and Hamilton, on which lumber had been cut, from 1896 down to 1906, were heard as witnesses, that is to say, those who sold their lumber to Mr. LeBlanc.

One after the other, these witnesses were heard, giving the exact amount of lumber cut by them, and how it was disposed of.

The Government of the Province was represented by Lawyer St-Laurent, of the firm of Galipeault, St. Laurent, Metayer and others, of the city of Quebec, and Mr. R. N. LeBlanc was represented by the Honorable John Hall Kelly, of New Carlisle.

The stand taken by Honorable Mr. Kelly was that Mr. LeBlanc owed nothing to the Crown, that he had paid all stumpage due by him, and that if there was any lumber delivered to him that he did not pay stumpage on, it was because the stumpage had been charged up by the Government to the farmers themselves who sold the lumber to him.

By the judgment that was rendered last week, the Court decided that Mr. LeBlanc owed nothing to the Crown, and the action taken by the Government was consequently dismissed.

SURVEYING THE FORESTS OF NEW BRUNSWICK

Such good progress has been made in the New Brunswick forest survey under Mr. P. Z. Caverhill, that 200,000 of the maps are practically complete.

The object of the survey is not only to estimate the timber resources of the province, but to learn the location of pure forest-growing land and sell fit for field crops so that future settlement can be wisely guided. Nearly all the provinces have shown tragic results of indiscriminate placing of settlers. Abandoned farms by the thousand testify to the evil consequences of allowing farmers to take up homesteads where the soil defies everything except tree life.

The Forester of New Brunswick has ordered a soil type map to be made of the whole forest area and this will be of the highest value in deciding what lands to open for settlement. The question of better fire protection in the timbered area is another urgent problem, engaging the Government's attention.
