BOLIVIA AND CHILI.

The Treaty of Peace Confirmed—The United PANAMA, Feb. 13.—Lima advices confirm the recent report of the signature of a treaty. of peace between Bolivia and Chili. The negotiations were conducted quietly. The truce is to be broken only by one of the parties giving a year's notice. Bolivia oncedes Chili's rate to occupy the territories now in its hands which formerly belonged to Peru or Bolivia. Chili undertakes to permit the transit of goods through Africa at moderate rates of duty. Bolivia has now become an inland country, since she possesses no seaboard. She has, however, obtained more facilities for commerce than she enjoyed before the war. Trescutt and Blaine, still in Chili, had a conference with Garcia Calderon, and subsequently with the Chilian foreign minister. The result or even subject matter of these inter-

views are unknown.

Trescott, in presenting the president of Chili with his credentials as envoy extraordinary and minister plenipotentiary, said if the recent occurrences appeared to weaken the loyal confidence which characterized up to the present the relations of the two governments the president of the United States is persuaded, it is only due to some unfortunate misunderstanding. The government of Chili will not fail to appreciate the natural deep interest that the United States feel for the rapid and honorable termination of the war between the sister republics of the Pacific. I trust your excellency will feel convinced that no effort of the government of the United States to employ or to bring about this happy result will involve the intention of suggesting any condition which might compromise the honor or endanger the true interests or wound the succeptibilities of either of the belligerents.

I venture to hope when I am enabled to explain the ideas of the president, you will find only an ardent desire that the time should arrive when the powers at present at war will resume a pacific and prosperous progress, which whilst strengthening their individuality strengthens them all for the preservation of that system a strong, free independent republic, which based on the traditions of the past, is the glory of the present and a guarantee of the future of both Americas.
