NEW YORK, Oct. 6, 1882—Bradstreet's spec'al telegrams report considerable improvement in corn crop. The September cotton report, published temorrow, will show that the general condition of the crop is fair, except in Texas, where it is distinctly good. No damage is reported by worms. Except to a certain extent in Mississippi, Louisians and Alabama there is small chance for a top crop. Finished iron is weaker; pig is firm, coal is active, and petroleum reacting on account of reports of increased production.
