Owing to the failure of the tobacco buyers to buy the 1920 tobacco crop, growers of Kent county declare they will not grow tobacco this season. As the sugar beet growers cannot obtain a satisfactory contract from the sugar plant in Chatham, it looks as though the farmers will revert to the growing of wheat, oats, barley and corn.

J. W. Symington, a prominent farmer and dairyman, died of heart trouble at his home in Camlachie Sunday morning after a week's illness. He is survived by his widow, three sons and three daughters. One son and son-in-law served overseas. The funeral services were held at the family residence on Tuesday at 1:30. Interment, with Masonic honors, took place at Wyoming Cemetery.

A very painful accident befel John McHattie, Mosa, He was assisting several neighbors buzzing wood, and the sleeve of his coat caught in the belt and he was thrown with terrible force against the machinery sustaining severe injuries to his head. At first little hope was held out for his recovery, but at present he is doing as well as can be expected.

John Morrison, D.D., Point Edward, Walker Austin McKellar, of Theford, was united in marriage to Lillian Vida Dunham of Point Edward. After the honeymoon, the young couple took up their residence on the farm of the groom, he being one of the progressive farmers of Bonanquet.

Nelson Cornwall, bailiff of the fourth division court of Lambton County for 48 years, and one of Sombra oldest residents, died at his home here at noon Monday. Deceased, who was 81 years of age, was born in St. Clair County, Mich., settling in Sombra with his parents when a lad of 10. He was of a quiet and unassuming disposition, but was always interested in the welfare of the village.

C. Henderson, of Detroit, while motoring from Sarnia to London, where his wife was to undergo an operation in one of the hospitals there, was held up and robbed of \$165, all the money he had, on a lonely spot on the lake road, just east of the Perch Creek bridge, near the Petrolia waterworks, on Sunday night. The highwaymen, after clubbing him over the head with the butt end of their revolvers, shoved his car over the bridge into the river to avoid pursuit. They made their getaway in a waiting motor car.

A very enjoyable evening was spent at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Bowles, Bonanquet, when the neighbors of the community met to bid them farewell before their departure to their new home on the London road. After games had been played everyone was called to order, and an address was read by Samuel Bailey. The family were then presented with a cut glass water set, oak tray, and a purse. Mr. Bowles responded in a few well chosen remarks. Lunch was served and then the fiddlers took their places, the evening being spent in dancing till the wee sma' hours of morning.



Russell Campbell, aged 33, of Campbell Bros., garage proprietors, of Melbourne, is dead, and three automobile bandits, Sidney Murrell, aged 21; his brother, Wm. George Murrell, aged 22, of Manor Park, London, and Henry J. Williams, of Toronto, are in the clutches of the police at London, charged with Campbell's murder, as the result of an attempt to rob the Melbourne branch of the Home Bank at 11 o'clock Monday morning. The bandits took about \$1000 which was recovered when they were arrested. The staff of the bank is made up of R. E. McCandless, Miss Agnes Campbell, teller, and Miss Irma Wright, ledger-keeper. Miss Wright was just leaving the bank to have the Union Bank across the way mark a check when the robbers brushed by her, going into the premises. She rushed into a store next door and gave the alarm resulting in the capture of three of the hold-up men. In rushing to the relief of the bank staff Campbell was shot dead by one of the bandits.
