Cornelius Metcalf, who in his early days resided on the Pansy Hall farm, Enniskillen, died at his home in that township the other day, aged 78 years.

Mr. P. Bondy's house, McGregor tp., was destroyed by fire last week, during the absence of the occupants. All the household goods were consumed.

The Oddfellows of Leamington have purchased a lot and will erect a three-storey building thereon. The third floor will be used as a lodge room.

Jean Wing, a laundry man of Alvinston, has made his pile there and is returning to China to spend the rest of his days. He has been in Alvinston eight years.

Geo. M. Baird, a former clerk of Harwich township, died recently in Regina. He was a prominent Odd-fellow and has been secretary of the Grand Lodge of Saskatchewan for several years.

Dorothy, youngest daughter of Mr. and Mrs. P. E. Lumley, Glencoe, had the misfortune to fall off a chair at their home on Saturday morning, breaking her collar-bone.

A farmer in Biddulph, George Walls, was found to have six barrels of mash containing seven per cent of proof spirits, on his farm, and he was fined \$200 and costs.

Ailsa Craig council sent a deputation to Toronto to interview the government concerning the proposal to place a subway under the railway crossing on the Main street of that village.

While attending to his work at the sugar factory Thursday, Pat Egan had two toes of his right foot broken. A large iron bar slipped and fell on his foot, causing the accident. Dr. H. A. Taylor is attending him.

Gordon McKenzie, a former well-known Sarnia man, died in Winnipeg last week. He operated a wholesale hardware in partnership with his brother. His father was the late John McKenzie, hardware man of Sarnia.

Solomon Coatsworth, one of the pioneers of Essex County, and one of the best known men in the county, died at his home in the second concession of Gosfield South, near Ruthven, on Wednesday morning, in his 85th year.

The coroner's jury empanelled to enquire into the circumstances surrounding the death in Fingal on the night of Saturday, January 20, of Cyrenus Marr, returned a verdict that his death was caused by the drinking of moonshine whisky.

The Forest branch of the Dominion Canners is making contracts for peas only this year. It has been decided not to pack any corn at this plant this season. L. R. Hamby will be in charge of the factory operations and D. R. McCahill in charge of the farms.

Mrs. Emma Jane Henderson, of the Egremont road, Adelaide Township, and sister of the late wife of Premier Albert Greenfield, premier of Alberta, died Thursday of pneumonia after an illness of only a few days. She was 48 years old, and besides her husband leaves a family of nine children.

Frank M. Syer, 47, of Thamesville died Thursday morning. Mr. Syer had been ill for more than two weeks of pneumonia, but his death was unexpected. He lived in Thamesville all his life, learning the flour mill business with his father, the late T. M. Syer, in the Tecumseh Flour Mills of which he has been the proprietor for some time.

The death occurred on the London road, on Thursday evening, Feb. 1st, at the home of W. E. McMurray, of their second daughter, Mildred H., aged 11 years and 10 months. The deceased had been confined to her bed for six weeks with inflammatory rheumatism which she never survived.

Rev. G. N. Clayton, Methodist minister, Dresden, had a narrow escape from death recently, when an automobile he was driving plunged into the St. Clair river, while Mr. Clayton was on his way across to the American side. Only the fact that the rear end of the car hung to the sides of the hole, while Mr. Clayton climbed to safety, saved his life.

Andrew Wickens, inland revenue officer for the past 12 years, Wallaceburg, dropped dead at his home Thursday morning. He had been in good health, but on arising he complained of illness. He was 60 years old. The late Mr. Wickens was a prominent Oddfellow and a Conservative. His wife, who has been ill for over a year, was absent on a visit when the death of her husband occurred. He is survived, also by two sons, Ivan and Earle.

Word was received at Wyoming Sunday that Dr. Wesley Mahan, at one time an assistant to the late Dr. W. Newell here, passed away at his late home in Vancouver, B. C., on Saturday. Dr. Mahan is the only son of Mrs. John Mahan, of the village. His father, Rev. J. Mahan, passed away some years ago. Dr. Mahan leaves a widow and one daughter.

Mr. John Wheeler, Dresden, was taken down with a stroke on Thursday last. He had just returned to the flour mill after delivering and jumped off the sleigh when he was stricken. His right side was completely paralyzed and he fell up against the sleigh, where he was found later by his employees.

Donald Fletcher, 45, of Mount Brydges) who was taken to Victoria Hospital last week suffering from abdominal injuries as the result of his having been tossed by a mad bull, was reported as improving last night. He was injured to the train by a Mount Brydges doctor. Dr. W. J. Stevenson took charge of the case in London, performing an operation.

Riverside, the only churchless town in Ontario, is due to lose this doubtful distinction. Alphonse St. Louis, former reeve of the town, has offered a site for a church. Rev. Fr. F. X. Laurendeau, pastor of Our Lady of the Lake church, Ford, announced that plans for a church are being prepared. The site is located on Intersection road, south of the new separate school. The church will cost without equipment, about \$50,000.

That thousands of dollars will have to be spent on bridges in the county of Middlesex within the next two years is the opinion of members of the county council. Steps to this end would have been taken at the session just closed, but the expenditures of the county are so high now that members decided to leave the matter over till the June session, when a committee will likely be appointed to map out a program. It has been pointed out that bridges in the county are not safe for the heavy loads which traverse them today. They were built as far back as in the 70's, and were constructed to carry loads not in excess of six tons, but today they are subjected to ten and twelve tons.

Reports are encouraging for a successful season in the work of the Wyoming branch of the Ontario Horticultural Society. The initiatory work accomplished in 1922 was gratifying. Grants of money were given the Wyoming Bowling Club, which was used in preparing the soil and planting a beautiful row of cannae along the west side of the bowling green; also in the construction and planting of flowers in other parts of the village, in which \$50 worth of tulips and other bulbs were planted last fall ready for spring blooming. Based on the success of the work done during the first year of its organization in the village, it is fully expected that at least a membership of 100 will be obtained during the present year.

The sale of Ova Tinkle's on the 7th concession, Cottam, on Tuesday afternoon was attended by an immense crowd. Buyers were present from all parts of the county and this in spite of the cold blustery weather. Mr. Tinkle had an excellent lot of horses and cattle to sell and good prices were obtained, a 3-year-old sorrel mare bringing \$200, a team of bays \$330, a bay and a brown mare \$170 each; a two-year-old colt -130, a 9 months old colt \$80, and a Shetland pony \$100. Cows sold from \$65 to \$90, while pigs brought good prices.

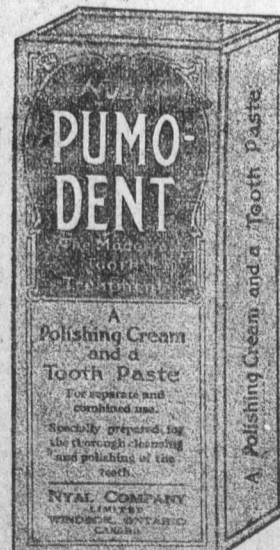
