Biographical Notices.

In our last issue we reported the death of the late Mrs. James Longley, who died on the morning of its publication. The deceased lady was the daughter of the late Robert Bath, whose father, John Bath, emigrated from Yorkshire to this province and country about 1775, and was permanently domiciled in Graville, a few miles to the westward of this town, on lands still in the ownership and occupation of his descendants. Her mother was a daughter of the late Augustus Willoughby, of some years a Society's Teacher in the township of Wilmet, and the daughter of the late Samuel Willoughby, M. D., a native of Connecticut in the old Colonial times, and the first representative of the township of Cornwallis in the Nova Scotia Assembly. One of her maternal uncles, the late Samuel Augustus Willoughby, was a well known and widely respected Art and Theatrical critic in New York, where he died only a few years ago. It will thus be seen that the late Mrs. Longley was, pre-eminently, of a noble and distinguished family. She was born in Graville in 1815 and was educated there. In the 22nd year of her age, she married the husband who still survives her and the union was blessed by the birth of an only child, a son, who died just before attaining his majority. This was a great loss to both the parents and especially to the mother, whose health was never so robust as before.

It would be difficult, perhaps, to find another woman more loved and respected for amiable and unselfish qualities. Every body who came into intimate friendly relations with her could not but be impressed by her gentleness of thought and conduct. Her ladylike and agreeable manner, thoughtful for others, speaking always the kind rather than the reproving or disrespectful word, she was a universal favorite in her society. Patient and persevering, she continued to maintain these characteristics until the day of her decease. Verily a good woman has departed, and in her place one whose memory will long survive in the hearts of a large circle of relatives to whom we tender our sincerest sympathies in the loss they have sustained by her decease.

Rich Gold Field at Folly Mountain.

A TWENTY ONE YEAR old Nova Scotia is far famed for its natural gold deposits; formerly these finds were confined to Halifax county, that was in the days when the Waverley, Montague, Oldham, and Newfound leads were discovered, since then gold in paying quantities has been found in other counties of the province, clearly proving that the province down by the sea is rich in the precious metal. The latest discovery in gold has just been made, this is the Colchester that is showing up. Mr. John McGillivray of Ohio, Antigonish county, is the discoverer of the twenty nine tons of gold at Folly Mountain. Mr. McGillivray in conversation with a Head Light reporter said that the lead was very rich, he showed the scribble a number of times, and developed the lead and hopes to be able to open up one of the richest mines yet discovered in the province. The lead is within easy access to the main road leading to Wallace's Folly Mountain corner, and is also near the I. C. R.—Head Light.

The Digby and Annapolis Railway.

Mr. F. A. Jones, of the Digby and Annapolis Railway was in the city yesterday, and in answer to the inquiries of a Gazette reporter he said that since work was commenced on the road in May last, very good progress had been made. The road is twenty-one miles in length, and with contractors, Messrs. O'Neill & Connel, have had 150 teams and 400 men at work on the different sections all summer. The grading is nearly all completed with the exception of a few short sections where large cuttings have to be made, as at Moore River and near Digby. The cutting at Moore River is about 12000 yards and 37 feet deep. There have also been three pile drivers at work for some time and from this they will probably be kept at work day and night. They are engaged in driving the piling for the bridge at Great Joggins and Little Joggins. The bridge at Great Joggins will be a trestle bridge, and the bridge at Little Joggins will be a girder bridge. The length of the bridge is about 1300 feet. The bridge over Little Joggins river will be 1100 feet long and will be constructed the same way. It is also having an 80 foot draw. The Bear River and Moore river bridges will be constructed on the same plan. The bridge over the draw 160 feet in length. The Bear River bridge will be the largest on the road. It will consist besides the 160 foot draw, of four spans of 120 feet each, and will approach will measure about 1700 feet in length. The Moore River bridge will be 1800 feet long and will have a span of 180 foot spans, and the 160 foot draw.
