DECISION FILED IN ANAPOLIS CASE.

Annapolis Royal.—Judge Grierson has filed his decision in the habeas corpus application recently made before him in connection with the children of the late Dr. P. H. Young, of Lawrencetown. The mother now living in Baltimore, Ind., has made two other unsuccessful attempts to get her children from Mrs. Elliott of Lawrencetown, into whose custody they were placed by court order. Judge Grierson has followed the decision made by Mr. Justice Mellich, when the matter was before him some years ago, and has found that the mother is not entitled to have possession of the children.

There is an estate of over \$12,000 belonging to the children involved, and it is believed that the latter will now appeal to the Full Bench of the Supreme Court.

HIGHWAY NOTICE

Closing of Roads.

The attention of the public is respectfully called to an Act to amend Chapter 77 of the Revised Statutes of 1923 of "The Load of Vehicles Act," passed the 9th day of April, 1924, A.D. Be it enacted by the Governor, Council and Assembly, as follows:—
1. Section 7 of Chapter 77 of the Revised Statutes, 1923, the "Load of Vehicles Act," is repealed and the following substituted therefor:
7. (1) No person shall operate a motor vehicle that is subject to the provisions of the Motor Vehicle Act on any highway in any municipality after the first day of March and before the first day of June following without the permission of the Superintendent of Highways or of such other officer as may be appointed by the Provincial Highways Board for that purpose first had and obtained.
(2) The Provincial Highways Board from time to time in each year may, and is hereby authorized and empowered with the approval of the Minister of Highways, to exempt from the provisions of Sub-section 1 of this section, for the whole or any part of the period between the first day of March and the first day of June following in the year and for which the exemption is granted, every person operating any motor vehicle as a motor vehicle of any particular class that is subject to the provisions of the Motor Vehicle Act, on all highways within any municipality or municipalities which highways in the opinion of the Provincial Highways Board will not be unreasonably damaged by reason of the granting of such exemption.

DR. CUTTEN ON "THE ONLY WAY TO GET BRAINS."

"Breed Them" he Says—Urges Early Marriages For Intelligent Persons.

Philadelphia.—Dr. George B. Cutten, president of Colgate University, formerly of Acadia College, Nova Scotia, Tuesday told members of the Philadelphia Baptist Ministers Conference that the only way to get brains is to breed them. He declared that the present increase in the nation's population came almost entirely from immigrants with a low degree of intelligence.

Educated and intelligent persons should marry sooner than others, he said. Preparatory school work must be cut down so that a man will be able to support a wife before the age of thirty, which is almost impossible now. He declared that "we are over-loading the human machine and as a result present day life is too much for many persons."

VITAL STATISTICS FOR NOVA SCOTIA.

September Births And Marriages Show Decrease From Previous Year.

Provisional figures compiled by the Dominion Bureau of Statistics for the month of September, 1924, show that there was 532 births, 488 deaths and 337 marriages recorded in the province of Nova Scotia. In the case of births and marriages these figures show a decrease in number over those for September, 1923, while the number of deaths in comparison with September, 1923, show an increase.

Birth returns for the whole of Canada, exclusive of Quebec, in September, 1924, number 12,211, being 6,110 males and 6,101 females, as compared with 13,196 in September, 1923. The equivalent annual birth rate per 1,000 population for the month was 21.8 in 1924 and 24.0 in 1923. New Brunswick had the highest birth rate, the report showing it to be 25.4, and British Columbia had the lowest 15.7. The rate in Nova Scotia was 21.2.

Total deaths in an estimated population of 6,323,000 for September 1924, numbered 4,887 as against 4,915 in a population of 6,690,000 in September, 1923. The equivalent annual death rate for September, 1924 was 8.7 per 1,000 population, as compared with 8.9 in September, 1923. Nova Scotia stood second highest in the equivalent death rate per 1,000 with 11.1. New Brunswick was highest with 12.8.

There were 337 marriages reported in Nova Scotia in September, 1924, as compared with 413 in September, 1923 giving an equivalent annual rate per 1,000 population of 7.7 and 9.4 respectively.

FORD PAID EMPLOYEES \$253,001.528 in 1924.

Largest Payrolls Were at Detroit Factories With a Total of \$172,820,145.

Detroit, Mich.—Employees in the Ford organization were paid more than \$250,000,000 in wages and salaries in 1924, according to the payroll totals made public here Thursday at the office of the Ford Motor Company.

The largest payrolls were at the Highland Park and River Rouge plants of the company here, the total for these two alone reaching the enormous figure of \$172,820,145.66 for the last year.

At other plants and at branches throughout the country the company in 1924 paid employees a total of \$72,532,476.53. The figures given out also include wages and salaries paid at the Lincoln Motor Company, a division of the Ford Motor Company; G. E. Johansson Company, Inc., and the Fordson Coal Company, which totaled \$8,648,906.18, bringing the grand total for the organization up to \$253,001,528.37.

H. B. HARDWICK ESTATE OVER FIFTY THOUSAND.

Annapolis Royal.—The will of the late H. B. Hardwick was probated here Thursday, disposing of an estate of over \$50,000, the greater part of which is in cash and government bonds. The bequests, with the exception of \$500, which is left to the Methodist church here, are all to members of deceased's family, and are as follows:

Albert W. Bartheaux, \$1,500; Alfred B. Hardwick, of Toronto, a nephew, \$1,500; Mrs. Ada Corning, \$500; Ira W. Hardwick, of Brooklyn, N. Y., a nephew, \$500. All these bequests are to be paid free of succession duties. H. B. Hardwick, of this town, a nephew, is left several parcels of real estate, including the Fisher Block on St. George street. The balance of the estate goes to the widow.
