Fresh salmon, of course, is the best to use, but cannod salmon is very good. In using the latter drain off all the oil, semove bits of skin and bones, and chop the fish very fine. In making the cauca have a heaping spoonful of the cornstarch, and stir into the butter until perfectly smooth. Then add the milk very slowly, beating all the time. The sauce should be thick when done. Now stir the chopped fish into the sauce, and set away are in until thereaughly cold. on ice until thoroughly cold.

Then shape into croquettes, roll in sifted bread crumbs, then in beaten age, then in crumbs, and fry in a wire basket in fat hot enough to brown a

bit of bread while you count sixty as the clock ticks.

Halibut or haddock make an appetizing foundation for croquettes instead of salmon, and this is a good way to use broken hits left from baked or boiled fish. To prepare the crumbs, put pieces of stale bread in the oven to dry; when they are brittle pound fine with a rolling pin, and then sift through a wire sieve. If put in a dry place in a fruit jir they can be kept a long time.


