The services in the Church during the summer have been much as usual, the Rector having only been absent one Sunday. In July, Rev. Professor Clark preached on three occasions, and in August, Rev. Edward Cayley assisted the Rector. On September 9th, Rev. Marmaduke Hare began his ministry.
