Night and Sunday rates are not available with Austria, France, Liechtenstein, Greece and Switzerland.

Telex and TWX rates to Britain will be reduced to \$2.25 per minute from \$3-minimum one minute—and to most other European countries from \$3 to \$2.50 per minute. Some European countries will have a three-minute minimum charge, not having yet introduced the one-minute minimum rate.

In conclusion, I would like to add that this excellent performance by COTC follows a situation in which this Crown Corporation in 1968-69 earned a net profit of \$5.8 million and returned \$6.2 million in taxes. This year the Crown Corporation waived a \$5 million government loan allocated to it, and I am informed that COTC will not be requesting further funds from the government during the coming year.

I hope that this performance by COTC in reducing rates by amounts of up to 33 per cent will serve as an example to private enterprise and an example that private enterprise will strive to follow.

Of course I am pleased to hear the minister's announcement, but I do not really think that the Canadian organization had very much alternative because there had already been an announcement in the United States that rates between the United States and Europe were going to be cut substantially. But at least it is pleasing to know that Canadian overseas rates are also going to come down.
