PROMOTION OF CANADIAN GOODS IN SPORTS

Question No. 228—**Mr. Herbert:**

1. What percentage of sporting goods used in Canada are processed and manufactured in Canada?
2. What steps is the government taking to promote and encourage the manufacture and use of Canadian goods in Canadian sports?

Mr. D. M. Collette (Parliamentary Secretary to President of the Privy Council): I am informed by Statistics Canada and the Department of Industry, Trade and Commerce as follows: 1. 54 per cent of sporting goods are manufactured in Canada.

2. The government, through the Department of Industry, Trade and Commerce has financially assisted many Canadian sporting goods companies with grants, loans and loan guarantees. Product development and restructuring grants to improve competitiveness have been made to manufacturers of hockey sticks, ice skates, cross country skis and ski boots. Loan guarantees and direct loans have also been made to a number of other companies manufacturing these products.

In addition, the Department of Regional Economic Expansion through its Regional Development Incentive Program (RDIA) has financially assisted the establishment and expansion of over 15 firms manufacturing sporting goods.

This government assistance has contributed in establishing Canadian manufacturers as world leaders in the manufacture of hockey sticks, skates and protective equipment and as major cross country ski suppliers to the North American market.

Tariff reductions in materials and parts have also encouraged increased manufacturing of sporting goods in Canada.

DOMESTIC PETROLEUM INCENTIVES—FRONTIER INCENTIVES

Question No. 263—**Mr. Herbert:**

1. Did Dome Petroleum Ltd. make representations to the government concerning frontier incentives and, if so, was there a response?
2. Is the government proceeding to inventory and evaluate the northern resources and, if so, what are the results to date and when can a full report be expected?

Mr. D. M. Collette (Parliamentary Secretary to President of the Privy Council): In so far as the Department of Energy, Mines and Resources is concerned: 1. Prior to the expiration of the frontier exploration allowance on April 1, 1980, the government received a number of representations from Dome Petroleum and other companies concerning such incentives. On April 8, 1980, the Minister of Energy, Mines and Resources and the Minister of Finance announced that the incentive would be replaced by a program currently being developed, in part as a public response to a number of representations being received.

In so far as the Department of Finance is concerned: 1. Yes, on a number of occasions. The company's proposal were acknowledged and considered. The company was informed on April 8, 1980 that the tax incentive which expired on March 31, 1980 would be replaced with a new incentive program. The new program is currently being developed.

In so far as the Department of Indian Affairs and Northern Development is concerned: 1. Yes, Dome Petroleum Ltd. has made representations to the Minister of Indian Affairs and Northern Development seeking support for the continuation of frontier incentives. The government's response in the form of a new incentives program, has been announced by the Ministers of Energy, Mines and Resources and Finance.

2. Yes. The Northern Non-Renewable Resources base is continuously being inventoried and evaluated as a part of the ongoing departmental responsibilities. Consequently, estimates
