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soldiers, at any rate, do not generally show to the enemy. (Prolonged Applause). Drawing an entrancing of the vision past, present and future of the human race, the latter bright with the buds of promise, the speaker concluded in these words:—Brothers, this vision is no fable. It is for an appointed time, and it will not tarry. It is the nearer for every outworn lie and for every trembling fraud. And all of you can aid it in its coming. Children, flinging seeds about in sport; little girls scattering flowers by the wayside; youth, manhood in its prime, and womanhood in her ministry of mercy—all may speed it forward. Be it ours in reverent mingling of faith and labour, at ones to watch and work for it. Do not look at the past-tha' has gone to give place to better times. Do not fear the advent of the future, my brother. It shall burnish in broader and safer glory. Come, one and all, come, and upon illustrious faith be anointed as Daniel of to:day—at once the prophet and the worker,—the brow bright with the shining prophecy the, handsfull of earnest and of holy deeds.
