RECIPES

Barley gruel—Mix two tablespoons of barley flour with a little cold milk, and stir into one quart scalded milk. Cook in a double boiler two hours. Add a little salt and sugar, and strain.

Oatmeal gruel—To three cups of boiling water, add one-half cup of coarse oatmeal and one-half teaspoonful of salt. Cook five hours in a double boiler. Thin with hot milk and strain.

Farina porridge—Bring one cupful of water and one cupful of milk to the boiling point. Add one-half teaspoonful salt. Sprinkle in one tablespoonful farina and stir until smooth. Cook one hour in a double boiler. Serve with a little sugar and top milk.

Beef juice—Chop and broil slightly lean round steak. Squeeze out the juice with a meat press or a lemon squeezer into a warm cup. Salt and serve at once.

Scraped beef—Scrape all the tender part from a thick piece of round steak. Season slightly with salt and make into small fat cakes. Broil for three minutes.

Mutton broth—Cut a pound of lean mutton into small pieces. Cover with a pint of cold water and let stand in a cold place two or three hours; then cook three hours over a slow fire. Cool, skim off any fat, salt and serve either hot or cold.

Tapoca—Scald one cupful of milk, add one-half tablespoonful of minute tapoca, two teaspoonfuls sugar, a dash of salt and nutmeg. Cook in a double boiler fifteen minutes.

Prunes—Wash one pound of prunes thoroughly in several waters. Then just cover with cold water, and let stand several hours. Put them over a slow fire in the water in which they have been soaking, and simmer until soft. Prunes cooked this way require no sugar.

Bread should never be given when it is fresh or soft. It is best cut in squares and put in the oven until it is brown and hard all the way through. Vary the kinds of bread with white, whole wheat, graham and rye bread.

Dried out bread should be crumbled into all soups and broths, since broths themselves are not important articles of food.

To jelly an egg, cover it with boiling water and set away from the fire for seven minutes. If a child does not like eggs and refuses them cooked, try this method. Beat up the white until light, add a pinch of salt and half a cupful of fresh milk. Sugar slightly if you wish, and give this a teaspoonful at a time until the baby likes it.

I have taken it for granted that rice pudding is just rice pudding; however, you may care to know how I make it for baby. Half a cupful of rice in plenty of boiling salted water. Let cook very rapidly uncovered until the water is gone. Then cover with milk and cook two or three hours in a double boiler. Add a little sugar and cream when served.

DUKE OF TECK MAY BE GOVERNOR-GENERAL

Earl Beauchamp Is, However, Said to Be Choice of Cabinet.

NEW YORK, March 11.—A London cable says: As successor to the Duke of Connaught for governor-general of Canada a small but powerful group is urging the Duke of Teck, brother of Queen Mary, it was learned today. The cabinet "choice" is Earl Beauchamp, once governor of New South Wales, Australia.

It is said in court circles that King George is not very fond of his brother-in-law, and that the Duke of Teck is not popular with the British public.

SHORTER HOURS FOR WOMEN WORKERS.

DOVER, Del., March 11.—(Can. Press).—A 55-hour week for women is provided for in a bill passed by the state legislature today by a vote of 25 to 8. House servants and nurses are not affected under the terms of the measure.

Children of widows may assist in supporting the family, but all under 14 years of age will be excluded from factory work except during the summer vacation, according to the provisions of the child labor bill, which passed the house by a vote of 24 to 6. This act also provides that it shall be illegal for children to sell newspapers or merchandise.
