OLD SURREY MAN A GREAT PLAYER

J. N. Crawford Said to Be the Best All-Round Crick-

tralian team, which plays at Rosedale on 11th, and 12th of June, has always been considered one of the foremost cricketers in England, and is undoubtedly one of the greatest cricketers in the world today. His brilliancy in snapping up chances in the field would be hard to beat, while his fine length bowling has been the admiration of every one. In batting in interstate cricket in Australia the last season Mr. Crawford has an average of 35, making on one occasion the fine score of 163, while at bowling he took 33 wickets at an average of 23 runs per wicket. He also has the great distinction, in conjunction with F. E. Holland, of putting up 308 runs for a fifth wicket partnership. When Mr. Crawford decided to settle in Australia, England lost one of the greatest cricketers she ever had. The supporters of the game in Toronto are extremely fortunate in having an opportunity of witnessing this great star.

Warren Bardsley, who rattled up 95 at Prince Albert on Saturday, made his first appearance in England with the Australian team in 1909 and created such a sensation that he was at once credited with being one of the greatest left-handed batsmen the world had ever seen. During that season Bardsley in all played 51 innings, making a total of 2180 runs, his highest score being 219, and finished with the magnificent average of 46.39. It was in that year in a test match against England that this great batsman established the great record of making 136 and 100, being the only cricketer in the world to accomplish this brilliant record, which still remains unbeaten. Bardsley's average during last English tour was still greater, he having made over 2500 runs in the season.

Bardsley's style has always been much admired, as he scores very rapidly, hits all around the wicket, and generally gives the men in the field a busy time.


