Baggage.

The United States supreme court has handed down a decision of great interest to travelers who lose their BATHING trunks. The case arose where an eastern woman lost her trunk and claimed \$2000 for the loss of her property. She sued for that amount and the court allowed it. The railroad carried up the case and the supreme court reversed the lower court and allowed the woman \$100, which is the liability the railroad fixes in its schedule for lost trunks.

In order to get more than the \$100, the complainant should promptly notify the company of his claim, and if he doesn't do that, the railroad will insist that the damage limit is \$100, according to the terms upon which the passenger accepted its service, and the court will allow no more, unless the passenger has promptly filed a claim for more. That is the law as laid down by this decision.
