chilling Colds in Winter must benumb the Senfes, and whose hazy and thick Foggs in Summer must raise Consumptions, involve in Misery, and an ill State of Health.

Let then the Posses of New England, fo much enraged at the giving up Cape Breton, that they threaten a Mutiny, people this New Colony, and stand upon the Defenfive for their own Preservation; but let not those of OldEngland, or even Old Scotland itfelf, expose themselves to such an unwholefome Climate, where Money is very fcarce, and everyThing extreamely dear; where the Prices of Work are as great as in London, and where every Hour of the Day they may be in Danger of falling a Sacrifice to a robuss, vigorous, and favage Set of Mortals, who are incensed by a Party, naturallyEnemies to the British Isle.
